The notice we have taken of him has been on public grounds, nor should his production have obtained a place in this paper, had we not at once seen the propriety of suffering him to convict himself before the country he endeavores to betray If we ever take notice of him again in any way it will be only from similar motives, though we think it will be hardly ever necessary to say a word about him again.

The usurpations of America upon the British flag are notorious; her hollow neutrality; her predatory commerce, her whole mercantile system founded on a subtle species of contraband and amuggling, which for its baseness and extent has had no parallel in the history of nations, has long demanded a check.

This expedition, which took place in the night between the 6th and 7th, was undertaken principally by the Parisian troops, who have covered themselves with glory.

The season is very mild, the roads are excellent, the buds are appearing on the trees, herbage has begun to cover the face of the country; but it will be a month longer before the cavalry are able to prozue instillence from it. The Emperor has ellablished at Magdeburg, under the orders of Marihal Brune, a corps of obtervation, which will be compoted of nearly Sa,000 men, one half of them French, and the remainder Dutch & Confederates of the Knine; the Dutch troops amount to 20,000.

The French divisions of Montor and Boudet, which make also a part of the corps of ordervation, will arrive at Magdeourg on the 15th of May. Thus much I believe, that whatever may be the consequence, Great Britain will not be easily brought to acknowledge that the flag of any nation thali protect deserters from her Navy or Army in time of war-as an acknowledgement of that would in a short time, completely annihilate her whole system of detence. I feel extremely burt at any thing which feems to threaten the harmony and happinels of either country."


