

JACOB VOEGDES vs. WILLIAM DUANE.

FATS.—On Saturday morning last, Capt. Vogdes called at the office of the editor of the Aurora and inquired if he could see Col. Duane. He was answered in the negative. He came again about 2 o'clock, and was informed that Mr. Duane had no business with or desire to see Capt. Vogdes. Capt. Vogdes then asked Mrs. Duane, who was in the office, if she would carry a message from him to Col. Duane. Mrs. Duane, although fully sensible of the delicacy & gallantry of the proposal, declined its acceptance. The captain then retired.—About dark he again returned, and in the office of Mr. Duane, made the usual inquiry. The patience of Mr. Duane being by this time exhausted and his feelings awakened by the language held to Mrs. Duane, he determined to compel the enemy to retreat. On entering the door he said "capt. Vogdes I am surprised you should trouble me in this manner, after the contemptuous reply I made you in presence of the officers of the legion."—"Continent Duane, I only wish a few words with you."—"Sir, I will have no conversation with you, and I desire you will leave my house."—"I shall not leave your house until I please." As soon as this declaration met the ear of Mr. Duane, he struck the captain in the face and laid it open, with his knuckles, under the left eye. Vogdes then seized Duane by the collar with a view, being very powerful, to secure his head under his (Vogdes) arm, but Duane by a sudden jerk of his elbow in the stomach of his antagonist extricated himself. Two young men separated the parties, and the captain went away.

Though it clearly appears that no part of the law of nations justifies Great Britain in impressing passengers (who are not military enemies) out of our ships, yet thirteen men have been impressed within a few days out of the American ship *Blanca* from Newry by the British ship *Squirrel*. None of these men probably were sailors. Even the tyrannical doctrine is a practice of impeding in England do not extend them to farmers, and mechanics and traders, which it is probable that devoted Britishmen were. Therefore, if our ship had been British, the impressments would have been unlawful. But what are we to say in this circumstance to execute mere English law, and defend English law, say the law of custom and power against every British charter and laws of rights, on board a ship foreign to England, in which she has no jurisdiction?

It is a question not to be hastily negated, whether the taking of pledges for the redelivery of passengers, lawfully and temporarily provided by our flag, ought not to be authorized by act of congress? Should a war take place, it would merit consideration whether British subjects to the amount of all afloat and impressed out of our ships should not be held for a strict exchange.

Should they take all our citizens in peace as well as war, we should be crippled, if we did not secure their return by pledge. If England can take one of our citizens in peace by impressment, she can take the whole. England by this conduct to our citizens and flag tells in the plainest language of actions, which speak louder than words that we are not yet an independent people, that we have no flag, as an independent nation.

RIGHT OF SEARCH.—It has been said by some that a vigilant armed ship has as good a right to search a neutral public armed ship, as a private neutral merchantman. This is not at all true; but it is not even to be forgotten, that the right of search does not extend to any persons, but military enemies.

Letters patent were issued by the U. S. to Dr. W. Lewis of York county, Pennsylvania, on the 10th inst. granting him the exclusive privilege of using and vending to others in an improved machine for the purpose of making pills. With the assistance of this machine, any number of pills may be formed from a given quantity of the mass, without the drawing of fingers.

MELANCHOLY LOSS OF THE SCHOONER CHARLES OF PORTLAND.

Letters from Portland, received in town, inform that the sch'r *Charles*, capt. Adams, of Portland, bound from that port, for Portland in a thick fog, ran on a reef of rocks, Richmond's island, near Portland light house, on Sunday evening; when the sea made a fair breach over her; and out of twenty-two passengers on board, six were lost! Among the persons drowned, whose names have reached us, are the following: Capt. Adams, and wife; (Capt. Adams was three men, got on shore about 2 o'clock, but overcome by the shocks of his wife, attempted to regain the wreck, and was lost; Mrs. Richards of Portland, and her two children; (Mr. Richards' husband was saved; Mr. Josiah Hayden's wife and child; a sister of Mr. Richards, from Dedham; and Mr. Eleazer Ally Richards, of Portland; (Mr. Jenks had taken himself to the shoals, but died in that position, and was found hanging to them.) Mr. Sidney Thaxter one of the passengers, arrived at Portland, at 9 o'clock Monday morning, and states that he left 6 persons clinging to the threads, 4 men, 1 woman, and a boy—These are all the names of the particulars, that we have been able to obtain. *Denton Gaz.*

The following are the concluding notes of a correspondence between Messrs. Blanchard & Tazewell of Norfolk, on which the difference between these gentlemen has been amicably and honorably adjusted.

"LITTLETON W. TAZEWELL, ESQ.

"Sir—Although I have a right in common with other citizens, to examine, and if necessary, to arraign the conduct of public agents at the bar of public opinion—although I have exercised this right and shall always reserve it to myself, yet I had no intention of injuring your character as a man and a citizen, in the remarks made in the Herald of the 7th instant, of which I am the writer.

Which being shown to and approved of by Mr. Tazewell, he immediately wrote the following to Mr. Blanchard:

"THOMAS BLANCHARD, ESQ.
"Sir—In consequence of the receipt of your note of this morning, I can have no hesitation to say, and I deem it my duty to state explicitly, that the harsh expressions contained in a piece lately published by me in the Ledger, were only intended to apply to him who should design to wound my feelings as a gentleman or my character as a citizen—and you

having no such designs or wishes, of course they cannot apply to yourself; I do not wish them so to be understood, but recall them so far as they can be referred to you.

The affair thus terminated. It was agreed then, that if desired by either of the parties, the letters last mentioned should be published by us, but no such instructions being given, we forbore to publish them. It was explicitly understood by all parties, that no publication was to be made except under the proper names of the parties themselves.
