"Str-Although I have a right in common with other citizens, to examine, and if necessary, to arraign the conduct of nublic agents at the bar of fublic opinion -although I have exercised this right and shall always reserve it to myself, vet I had no intention of injuring your character as a man and a citizen, in the remarks made in the Heraid of the 7th instant, of which I am the writer.
