A decisive Victory was gained by the Forces of Algiers over the troops of the Bey of Tunis about the 15th of May in the neighbourhood of Constantine—the news of which occasioned great rejoicings at Algiers.

Sidi Soliman Mili Mili was at Gibraltar, & part of his business appeared to be the purchase of Military Stores, for his matter, one cargo of which he had sent for Tunis.

All the Portuguese Squadron that was stationed at Gibraltar, with the exception of a Sloop of War, one Brig & a Schooner, had gone off Algiers, probably with a view of co-operation with Tunis.

All the ports of Naples, occupied by the enemies of his Sicilian Majesty, are declared in a state of blockade. This has been officially notified by the Marquis de Circello, minister for foreign affairs to the King of Sicily.

NOTICE TO PILOTS. And others sailing through Pamlico Sound. There is now on the west point of the Roanoke Shoal Buoy, with a mast and a square eye on the top of it, from this buoy the light Beacon on Shell Castle bears east, if your distance six miles; it stands in eleven feet water, rather within the point of shoal, and should not be approached nearer than a cable's length.

On the north-west point of the same shoal there is a nun Buoy which bears from the south west Buoy N. West, distant four miles, this also stands in eleven feet water, and the light Beacon bears from it south-east half east, between the Buoy and the Royal Shoal from which it is distant two miles. Care should be taken on the ebb tide not to come too near the Royal Shoal as it is steep. Vessels may steer south west by west from the Buoy on the Bluff until they make the N. N. West Buoy, where should be given a birth of half a mile.

In turning down between the N. W. and S. W. Buoys, you may stand to the Royal Shoal by the lead, but come no nearer than two fathoms.
