

not be without an object. That object we presume was to stir for the attack; to tempt them to advance upon the Passage to relieve Dantzic, and if they had advanced to make a feigned retreat towards the Villa of the Passage, and then to concentrate his columns, and having previously disposed of the force which was to occupy the position he had previously surveyed, to put an end at a single blow to the Russian army and the coalition. Either of these designs would come within a scope of practice, and be productive of all the effects that an able general could desire.

There are however many intelligent men who calculate on a peace. The Swedes are said to be discontented with a war which has produced them nothing but disasters and taxes, without even the prospect of being bettered by the most successful issue of a war against France. Their monarch is under the necessity of being long to fortune, and abandoning hostility. On the other side the emperor of Russia is represented to be disposed to peace, or rather that he never was in earnest in the war, into which the faction which murdered his father late forced him. The Russian emperor is represented by persons well acquainted with his character, not of the first order of intellect, but of a very high order; his heart is said to be pure, and on that account those who are apprehensive that his politics may bring him to a premature death by the hands of the Russian nobles devoted to G. Britain.

It is certain that on the great point of the neutrality of the ocean, the Emperor of Russia, entertains the same sentiments, that are entertained by every nation but Great Britain, and we make no doubt that should Alexander escape confinement he will be found on the side of the neutral flag and the principles of Liberty.

A publication in your paper by Mr. Beverly, purporting to be an account of some occurrences which took place respecting general Wilkinson, before the grand jury, which lately attended the United States Court at Richmond; both certainly contain some errors. They will be rectified as far as any name is concerned by the publication of this notice.

There was no motion made to present general Wilkinson for high treason, that I remember; there certainly was no vote taken on such a question. A motion was made to present general Wilkinson for suspicion of treason. The jury divided, seven for, and six against the presentment. I was with the majority.

A motion was also made to present the general for a violation of the laws and constitution of the United States. I don't remember how the jury divided on this question, but I was with the majority.

I should not perhaps have troubled you with this address, had it not become necessary to correct another mistake.

I am informed that several gentlemen in Richmond have laid, and perhaps received under their hands, that they received an account from me, concurring with the statement made by Mr. Beverly. These declarations and certificates if any such there be, and be due to a misunderstanding or misapprehension of the terms of my conversation. I never did state to any person that the grand jury were divided on a motion to present general Wilkinson for high treason; or that any such question was made before them.

After the grand jury were discharged, and in course of the next day, sundry gentlemen of my acquaintance, at different times, and in places addressed me to the following effect:—We have heard contradictory accounts of the division of the grand jury, upon a motion to present general Wilkinson, (with a charge for a offence) which you have said to give us the correct account. I answered:—I believed the jury were divided, seven for, and six against the presentment. The misunderstanding, I suppose must have been this way:—That you had heard of Mr. Beverly's account of a motion to present for high treason, which was not made connected with any answer which could refer to other than the motion to present for suspicion of treason, which was made.

Or if any gentleman addressed me in terms which authorized my answer as applicable to a question of high treason I did not attend sufficiently to the terms of his question, or should certainly have set him right. I can be no more for wilful misrepresentation of this subject on the part of any. I will suppose none to exist.
