Their monarch is under the necessity of bealing to fortune, and abandoning hollility. On the other side the emperor of Russia is represented to be disposed to peace, or rather that he never was in earnest in the war, into which the faction which murdered his futier have forced him. The Russian emperor is represented by persons well acquainted with his character, not of the first order of intellect, but of a very high order; his heart is said tobe pure, and out that account those who are apprehensive that his politics may bring him to a premature death by the hands of the Russian noblesse devoted to G. Britain.

It is certain that on the great point of the neutrality of the ocean, the Emperor of Russia, entertains the same fentiments, that are entertained by every nation but Great Britain, and w make no doubt that thould Alexander escapaassassing the will be found on the side of the neutral flag and the principles of 1725
