JOHN LITTLE, alias FRANCIS, and AMBROSE WATTS, escaped from the Melampus at the same time, known to the above persons to be Americans, but have not been entered by my recruiting officer.

William Ware, Daniel Martin, and John Strachin state that some time in February last, there was an entertainment on board the Melampus, lying then in Hampton Roads—that while the officers, &c. were engaged, and all the ship's boats except the captain's, &c. were hoisted in—the helms and the two other men mentioned, availed themselves of a moment to seize the gig and row off—that as soon as they had got into the boat they were hailed to know what they were going to—They replied, they were going ashore—a brisk fire of musquetry instantly commenced from the ship—in defence of the boats on the hazard of their lives, they continued to pull, and finally effected their escape to land, namely, Sewall's Point—that they then carefully hoisted up the boat on the beach, raised up the boat, and placed that and the oars in the boat, gave three cheers, and moved up the country.

This report is in a true, we learn, to be formally verified in every material circumstance, by a recurrence to the sources of evidence pointed out by the season respectively.
