The emperor failed to Mr. Scheinitz that Prussia having consented to submit to the domination of Russia, the concluding of a peace became consequently very difficult, because Russia, instead of aiding France, to bring England within due bounds, and by that means to release Europe and the whole universe from its maritime tyranny, had put herself under the yoke of the English; that the king of Prussia, had only two modes left of returning to Berlin, to wit, either to be conducted there by the emperor Napoleon, at the head of his body guard, or by the Russians; that this last mode was certainly practicable, in the event of the French losing a battle on the other side of the Vistula; three between the Vistula and the Oder; and three more between the Oder and the Elbe; and thus coming nearer their own country, without being able to receive any reinforcements; that it concerned every good Prussian patriot to calculate what it would cost his country if the Russians made like progress, and if his principle "that people exist for kings; and that kings exist only in their people," should prevail in the cabinet of Kaenigsberg.

Extract of a letter from an Officer of the Virginia Detachment, dated July 17, 1862.

"Ten minutes before Captain Sheppard arrived on the beach, at Lynhaven Bay, a launch containing about 30 British seamen and marines, put off from the shore. Otherwise the detachment of horse must inevitably have had a encounter with them; and either killed or taken prisoners every man who resisted. An express, communicating this intelligence, arrived here last night about 3 o'clock; I rely upon this fact as certain, for I myself have this moment seen a letter written by a private of the detachment to this effect. The letter added that they were then (yesterday morning) in ambuscade, waiting and expecting the arrival of another British crew. We shall probably receive an account of this encounter to night, if one takes place. It is probable, however, that Sheppard's party was descried from the top-masts of the British squadron, and upon a given signal, their crew retired in their boats. Another curious circumstance has just come to my knowledge. Mr. Nimmo, a Lawyer of Norfolk, with three other companions, was walking the other day near the light-house at Cape Henry, about Lynhaven bay, when he descried 4 British officers. Nimmo and his companions were unarmed; the British officers had a brace of pistols and a sword each. When they were first seen, the officers rapidly retired; but afterwards stopped and entered into a parley. He enquired what they were doing on land? They said they were merely stretching their legs. Did they not know that the President's Proclamation interdicted their landing? They did; but they were doing no mischief. They had no fears from gentlemen; but only from the vulgar part of the community. Did they not intend to leave our coasts? They could not be fore they received new instructions from Halifax? But if we would send out the French vessels, they would immediately depart. Our men are not in danger; even from the guns of the tender, who comes and lays within a few hundred yards, to attempt to cover the landing of their crew, nor from their ships of war which are situated about a mile from the shore; because the sand hills which are blown up by the wind on the bay shore, as high as houses, like the moving waves of sand in the deserts of Arabia, are amply sufficient to shelter our troops from the British cannon.

"It is probable that we shall be moved to Lynhaven Bay in a few days."
