

advises from the continent several days later than any heretofore received; but they are not of importance. Bonaparte was at Dantzig, the beginning of June.

The rumors of an approaching continental peace, continued to prevail and obtain credit in Germany: and there is no doubt but that event was apprehended by the British ministry. The armistice with Sweden, and overtures from Russia for a continental congress, had induced the British government to dispatch a protest against any separate arrangement. It is not difficult to calculate however, the effect of such a remonstrance—the sun of Britain is set, and can never rise again with its former splendor:—there will be no more coalitions, unless against the tyrants of the ocean. There will be no peace but on such terms as the man, whom England has made the conqueror of Europe, shall dictate, and the nature of the terms he will grant must be well conceived by any one who has attended to the course of events.

We find that Bonaparte pursues his system of placing his generals at the head of the countries he has conquered—Lefebvre is made hereditary prince of Dantzig, and will no doubt receive a large portion of Pomerania, including the mouths of the Oder as his domain; and thus France has established a power on the Baltic, and has now the entire command of the greatest rivers and commercial towns in the north of Europe. Such are the fruits of the unbridled ambition of England, and of the folly or madness of the monarchs who were duped by her councils or bought with her gold.

Bonaparte promised his army that he would not return to France, until he had put it out of the power of his enemies again to disturb Europe; he broke no former promise, and we are persuaded will perform this also—Let the admirers of England, then, flatter themselves if they can with any change for its interests—the delay that has been so often spoken of, in advancing against the Russians, is the effect of sound prudence or of forbearance, it cannot be the effect of weakness or timidity. Should a battle ensue, its result will confirm all our predictions—it will give France the complete mastery, it will put it in the power of Bonaparte to give principalities to the other general of his armies, that have not yet been provided for.

Captain Hinton, of the Schooner Mary-Ann, who arrived at Savannah on the twelfth instant, in fourteen days from St. Thomas, informs, that on the 28th ult. he was spoke from a British sloop cutter, and ordered to hoist out his boat and come on board with his papers, and while in the act of launching her, several guns were fired at his vessel from the cutter; after which, he boarded the cutter, where he was detained an hour and then he was ordered to proceed on his voyage. Some night was fired into by the sloop of war Pert, captain Campbell, who ordered him to come on board with his papers, which was complied with. Capt. C. detained capt. H. and two of his men on board the Pert, and sent three of his men on board the schooner with instructions to proceed to Tortola; but owing to the mismanagement of the crew, the schooner was thrown on her beam ends, which threatened the cargo and injured it materially—finding it impossible to work the vessel in such a condition, the Englishman sent capt. H. and his men on board of his vessel, and took his own on board the Pert, when captain H. was permitted to prosecute his voyage as well as he could. Capt. H. on the 11th inst. about 12 miles to the northward of Tybee, was boarded by an officer from a tender to a British sloop of war, and was carried on board the sloop in the tender's boat. The conduct of the officer from the tender, to capt. H. was extremely abusive—dramming him for an American and a traitor, and the colours under which he sailed, and for not hoisting them when he saw one of his Majesty's vessels of war; and asking him with a sneer, whether he did not know that war was declared between Great Britain and America?

Should this question prove to be a truth, these "loyal subjects" may smell the bilge water in old Charon's boat, before they wish it.

To the President of the United States.

SIR,

Indignant at the late outrage and murder committed by a British man of war, on the crew of the United States ship Chesapeake, we the undersigned mariners of the port of Baltimore, respectfully beg leave to tender our professional services to be employed in such manner as you may conceive most useful, pledging ourselves as we hereby solemnly do, to contribute all in our power towards avenging the cowardly murder of our seafaring brethren.

But we believe that instructions have been given to our cruisers to detain hereafter such American vessels as shall not be defined for England, or for the ports of which the British government has not expressly interdicted the entry to state vessels by their instructions.
