In pursuance of this idea, it is now proposed, that proper persons in each district (and I understand there are four) be appointed by the Colonel of each regiment, to go round the respective districts in which they may be appointed, with subscription lists, to obtain, from such as are willing to subscribe, their engagement for an annual sum for five years, for the use of the regiment of the district, which shall be pieced in the hands of the regimental treasurer, to establish, with the assistance of regimental fines, a competent fund for the purchase of arms, ammunition, knapfacks, tents, regimental music, &c. &c. articles so indispensible in military establishments, that without them not a man can take the field, and the activity and spirit of the moment will dissipate in an idle parade. We know not the moment when we will be summoned to be on the alert-true courage consists in estimating the danger truly, and preparing accordingly; it is the part both of stupidity and cowardice to delay until the enemy is at our gates. . By such a fund as is now proposed, the effective force of the town will be relieved from what they are least able to bear-the expense of the outfit of the sufficient means, the well-disposed will have a noble opportunity of shewing their heartiness in the cause—and the two classes of rich and poor will be drawn cluser together, by liberality on one side, and a tivity on the other. The poor man will be satisfied that his wealthy neighbor bears his just proportion of the burtien of the public satery; and this will be added to his real, the consciousness that all (according to their : respective abilities) go heart and hand into the desence of our common commery.

"The demand for Cottons in general has been for some time tolerable fair, which it still continues to be ; but the sales not being equal to the import, we have at present an accumulation of Stock, and the purchasers having had the opportunity of selecting the good Cottons, what is on hand is principally middling and inferior quality.

"Several vessels with Cotton from New Orleans are just arrived, and others we understand are in the Channel. In the present state of the market, we cannot look for any immediate improvement in the prices, and some doubts may be ontertained of the present, particularly if a reverse in the events of war should be experienced by our Allies on the Conti-

"I'he demrnd being principally for New Orleans and good Upland Cottons, our supply of these, which is pretty heavy, will not much more than meet the consumptions Lea island and fine Cottons are less paquired for.

"The weather which we have lately had having been peculiarly fine for the season, the Farmers in the interior have senttheir wheat to market in every direction, which from the Canal navigation, they are enabled to do at a small expence. From this, and the impression produced by the large-arrivals of wheat and Flour both here and in London, the prices of these articles have fallen considerably; the first direumstance has, however, produced the principal effect. The future currency of these articles is quite precarious.

A tolerable supply of Pot Ashes having just come futward, we may calculate on a decline in the price but that of Pearls seems likely to be maintained.

TIPPO SULTAN'S LIBRARY .- The oriental Library of the late Tippo Sultan, which on the capture of Seringapatam, was preferred entire, and confilts of 2,000 volumes of Arabic, Persian. and Hindustane manuscripts, was thortly After that event conveyed to Calcutta, and deposited in the College of Fast William, where it much facilitated the labors and pursuits of the professors and fludents of those languages. This library was in the year, 1805, minutely examined by the Assistant Persian . Prosessor, captain Charles Stewart, and a descriptive catalogue explaining the subject of each volume, memoirs of the author, &c. formed of its contents. Since that gentleman's arrival in England, and appointment to the East India Company's College at Hartford, he has revised the work, and added an appendix, containing specimens of the Persian language (accompanied by translations) from the principal authors quoted in the catalogue, rendering it not only a useful book to the oriental student, but desirable by every person withing for information on such subjects, or curious of knowing the nature and extent of Mahommedan Literature, which, it must be remembered, had arrived at a great degree of splendor, when Europe was overcall with ignorance and barbarifm.-For the convenience of foreigners, to whom the English letters may not give the exact pronunciation of an oriental word the titles of the books will be also inscribed in the Arabic character.
