INCREASE OF REES .- The following easy method of taking the honey without destroying the bees, was communicated to the editor of the Cornwall Gazene, by a respectable French priest, who asserts that it is the mode generally adopted throughout France ;- In the dusk of the evening when the bees are quietly lodged, approach the hive and turn it gently over; having steadily placed it in a small pit previously dug to receive it, with its bottom uppermost, cover it with a clean new hive, which had been previously prepared, with two small sticks stuck across its middle, and rubbed with aromatic herbs. Having carefully adjusted the mouth of each hive to the other, so That no aperture remains between them, take a small stick and beat gently round the sides of the lower hive for about ten minutesor a quarter of an hour, in which timethe bees will leave their cells in the lower hive, and ascend and adhere to the upper one. Then gently lift the new hive with all its little tenants, and place it on the stand from whence the other hive was taken. This should be done some time in the week preceding midsummer tlay; that the bees may have time before the summer flowers are faded, to lay in a new stock of honey, which they will not fail to do, for their subsistence through the winter.
