TRIAL OF AARON BURR

Present—John Marshall, Chief Justice of the United States. The court assembled at 12 o'clock.—An immense concourse of citizens attended to witness the proceedings of this important trial.

Those were present, whose names are printed in Italics. The rest were absent.—Such as have a * prefixed to their names, were recognized at the former meeting of the Court.

Mr. Burr observed that it was not very probable, he should avail himself of any privileges which he might derive from any delay which had occurred in the furnishing him with the list of the jurors.

A short conversation then ensued upon the day of adjournment, when Mr. Burr observed that as such a measure would seem in some measure to depend upon his own consent, he should not hesitate to consent to an adjournment, provided it did not extend farther than Wednesday.

Mr. Burr observed that it might be proper to have the names of the Jury also called over, though not to impanel them at present. It would be premature now to impanel them as a sufficient time to examine the list, and to witness for the United States, were not present.
