The validity or fufficiency of the powers velled in the magistrate, was contested and argued by counsel for Blennerhaffet & the U.S. attorney: the relieft was, that the judge of the circuit court confirmed the eroft, and the prisoner was remanded for the purpole of being immediately fent to Richmond for trial. Blenneihaiset afferted that it had been his intention to proceed to Richmond to fland trial, that he wished to be attenue I to that place by perfors who would treat him with humanity.; avowing his fears of ever returning to his home, thinking his lite was then in danger. He was accordingly fent on for trial.

## TRIAL OF AARON BURR

Continued by adjournment and held at the Capital in the Hall of the House of Delegates, for High Trealon against the United States )

August 3d, 1807. PRESENT-JOHN MARSHALL, Chief Justice of the United States.

The court affe moled at 12 o'clock .- An im. mente concourfe of citizens attended to witness the proceedings of this important Trial.

A few minutes after Aaron Burr entered, attended by M ffrs Wickham, Martin Botts and Baker, and Mr. Altton of South Carolina. Mr.

E. Randolph enter d foon afterwards. Meifrs, Hay, Wirt and Mc Rae, attended as countel for the profecution.

Mr Hay outerved that he could take no steps in this buliness, until ne ned afcertained whether, the wilnesses summoned on the part of the United States were prefent; he therefore requelled that their names might be called over.

Mr. Hay was not certain whether he had the communication; but believed that it was among his papers. If it was there he would certainly produce it.

Mr. Burr. But if after a nearch, the gentleman finds that he has not that paper, will he confent out of court to issue, a subpoena to the President of the U. States under the qualification I have mentioned ! - I wish not at the present exigency, to derange the affairs of the government, or to demand the presence of the Executive officers at this place. All that I want is
