

The long and strenuously contested election for the city of Westminster terminated on the 23d May—in which the Hon. Lord Cochrane, J. Elliot, Sir Thomas Burdett, the right hon. J. Sheridan, and — Paul, Esq. were candidates. Sir F. Burdett had refused becoming a candidate for any office, alleging that in the present hopeless and corrupted state of the government, one honest and independent member could be of no avail; but on the application of a deputation of the electors, he agreed to be their faithfuleward, and was elected by a majority of near 1000 votes over Lord Cochrane; and had the poll continued two days longer Mr Sheridan would also have been above him—but he will be the sitting member, by a petition for bribery and corruption against Lord C. The expense of Sir Francis Burdett, amounting to upwards of 6000, was defrayed by the electors. Sir F. was not at the hustings during any period of the election. The cry of "Church and King" had lost its effect three days before the termination of the election; not, however, until several of their wisest and best men had lost their election viz. Lord Howick, Lord William Russell, &c. &c.

London papers.

A meeting of the first battalion of the 15th regiment of Maryland militia, (Baltimore county) was held on Saturday, the 8th inst.—after going through a number of evolutions, they retired to an adjacent house of entertainment, when the following proceedings took place. Major ISAAC DICKSON was called to the chair, and SAMUEL PEELERS, Esq. appointed Secretary.

The address from the committee of Norfolk with a circumstantial account of the murderous and cowardly attack of the British ship Leopard upon the frigate Chesapeake, being read, it was unanimously resolved, that although removed from the immediate operations of foreign commerce, and pursuing the peaceful occupations of farmers and planters, and earnestly desirous of preserving peace with all the world, yet when our honor as a nation is attempted to be sullied or impaired, we willingly hazard all our lives and our fortunes, in defence of what is more dear to us, than the ravages and horrors of war are dreadful, and therefore do highly approve of the manly conduct of our fellow-citizens at Norfolk, and will give them every support and countenance in our power.

Resolved unanimously, That we'll support with all our energies, the constituted authorities of our country in such measures as to their wisdom may seem most expedient, feeling perfect confidence in their patriotism and ability.

Resolved unanimously, That the foregoing resolutions be published in the newspapers of the city of Baltimore, and a copy thereof be forwarded to the President of the United States and the executive of this State, signed by the chairman and secretary.

Resolved, That the thanks of this meeting be presented to the chairman and secretary.
