The offer of your service in support of the rights of your country, merits and meets the highest praise; and whenever the moment arrives in which these rights must appeal to the public arm for support, the spirit from which your offer flows, that which animates our nation, will be their sufficient safeguard.

To the Legislature will be rendered a faithful account of the events which have so justly excited the sensibilities of our country, of the measures taken to obtain reparation, and of their result; and to their wisdom will belong the course to be ultimately pursued.

In the mean time it is our duty to pursue that prescribed by the existing laws; towards which, should your services be requisite, this offer of them will be remembered. I tender for your country the thanks you so justly deserve.

At a meeting of the First Battalion of the 7th Regiment of Maryland Militia, in Baltimore County, on Wednesday, the 19th instant, after performing the military evolutions of the day, the Battalion resolved itself into a committee of the whole, of which Colonel Thomas Dye Cockey, was unanimously chosen Chairman, and Capt. William Jamison, appointed Secretary.

Resolved, That Major Isaac Dickson, Major Joshua Frederick Cockey, Captain Abraham Hicks Price, Captain Stephen Wheeler, George Harryman, and John Bond, Esquires, be and they are hereby appointed a committee to draught resolutions expressive of the sense of this meeting in the present crisis of national affairs.

The committee having retired for a few minutes returned with the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted.

Considering the numerous instances of insult offered to the United States, and oppression practised on their citizens by the authorised agents of the British government for many years past, and viewing with unqualified indignation, with unmixed abhorrence, the late dastardly, unmanly, savage conduct of the commander of the British ship Leopard towards the United States frigate Chesapeake.

Resolved unanimously, That we cordially approve of and proudly sympathize with the American spirit displayed by our brethren of Norfolk, Portsmouth, Hampton, &c. on that sad occasion.

Resolved unanimously, That at the risk of every thing most dear to freemen, we will support the constituted authorities of our insulted country, in whom we have the fullest confidence, in all their endeavors, to obtain ample satisfaction for the monstrous outrage.

Resolved unanimously, That the foregoing resolutions be published in the newspapers of the city of Baltimore, and copies signed by the chairman and secretary be forthwith transmitted to the president of the United States and the governor of this state.

Resolved unanimously, That the thanks of this meeting be presented to the chairman and secretary for their conduct on the present occasion.

We can readily believe the following to be a true statement. It corresponds with Berkeley's letters to the British consuls at Boston and New-York: We copy it from the Philadelphia Register:

PRIVATE CORRESPONDENCE.
[Communicated for the Register.]
New-York, Aug. 22.—We have from our friends at Halifax, admiral Berkeley's account of the affair of the Chesapeake sent on at the instance of the admiral, for us to make what use of it we thought fit. It varies little from what we had previously understood.—The only thing of moment we learn by it, is that the measure emanated from himself—that it was not of his government. Strong hopes are entertained that the matter will be accommodated.

We think it necessary to notify to our subscribers, that having experienced a considerable loss of papers from the practice of delivering them indiscriminately when called for whilst the carriers are going their rounds, in which case many of our patrons receive two papers, which can be of no essential service to them, whilst it may be a serious disappointment to subscribers at a distance, we have been compelled to adopt a rule that no papers will be delivered at the office unless to those who regularly call there for them and are not served by the carriers. HERSEY AGRICULTURAL REPORT.
SUMMER—1807.

HAY—Large crops, exceeding those of any late year. Some of it damaged, a great deal well got in. Bottom and low meadows escaped floods with less injury than common.

HARVESTS—WHEAT—more abundant and better than any former year since the revolution. With wheat early sown and before in harvest time, somewhat grown in places.
RYE—Plentiful and well sown, some few crops excepted.

OATS—Unusually abundant and good. More flour than usually, and what was found is better.
FLAX—Large, thick, and well seeded—the coating not yet ascertained.
CORN—Never more promising, and seldom more planted.
BARLEY—But little sown—that little generally good.
On the whole, should Indian Corn turn out as well as it promises, a more plentiful year will never have been remembered in this state.
FRUIT—No scarcity, except of apples, of which there are very few.
