Messrs. Campbell and Whittle, against Messrs. Kirwans, of London, for upwards of 60,000%. Jamaica currency, the value of a cargo of sugars, consigned to and received by the defendants, Messrs. Kirwans were responsible for the loss by reason of their not keeping the sugar insured. The attorney-general and Mr. Stevens as counsel for Messrs. Kirwans. The appellants took a technical objection to o e of the counts of the declaration upon which the jury have found their verdict, and after a very elaborate and ingenious argument, Lord Ellenborough and the master of the Rolls were of opinion that the objection was fatal in point of form.
