Having been ordered by Captain S. Strett, of the Maryland militia, and Captain Porter, of the navy of the United States, to pursue some pirates who fled from the privateer schooner, taken near the mouth of Patuxent on Friday evening last, and having learned that they are now confined on board His Imperial Majesty's ship the Patriot, I have repaired on board that ship to request that they will be delivered to me, to be taken to Baltimore, there to be handed over to the civil authority for examination and trial.

HIACINTHE KROHM, Captain of a ship of the first Rate, Officer of the Legion of Honor, Commandant of the Patriot, and of the French fleet in the Chesapeake.
Captain Calhoun,
The men you demand are indeed on board of my ship's crew. I should have sent them yesterday morning to his excellency the Minister Plenipotentiary of His Imperial and Royal Majesty, my commander in this place, if I had had the convenience.
I shall take advantage of your Schooner to send them to our Ambassador. An officer of my ship will have written orders to deliver both the men and papers. I shall take no other precaution, persuaded gentlemen that you are as well convinced as we are, that Justice alone has the right of punishing men who have been convicted of having transgressed the laws. In consequence, Lieut. Hareng will accompany you in this mission.
