

For Baltimore next day; brig Rubicon, Thomas, for Boston; Susan Howard, for do. next day; ships Columbine, and set-sey, for do. uncertain; Hope, Lovett, for Salem, nearly load-d. sch'r Foster, New-York, discharging; brig Rufus King of Portland just arrived; Republican, Boston, do; Martha of Salem, nearly loaded; ship Hampden and Sidney for Philadelphia taking in; a fortnight before they sailed, a Spanish corvette, going to Spain, was taken in a calm by the British ship Elephant's boats—Capt. H. was chased into the capes by one of the British frigates; was not spoke by those who lay inside—the day before yesterday off Patuxent saw a sch'r that we took to be the Two Brothers from Havana; the Danish ship Venelia, from Havana, for this port, has been captured by the British Frigate Cleopatra and sent to Halifax.

Arrived, sch'r two brothers, Levingston, from Havana—sugar and coffee Albert Seekamp. Left, sch'r Adventure, from Baltimore, arrived the day she sailed. August 23d, spoke brig Daniel and Frederick, from Havana for Philadelphia. Saw a 74 frigate and sloop of war inside the capes, when she came in.

New-York, September 3.
ARRIVED,
The ship Venus, Runce, 35 days from Madeira. Left, ship Triumphant, Webster, in 2 or 3 days for Salem; brig Tropic, of Boston, for the Cape of Good Hope, in 3 days; sch'r Lark, for Boston in 5; brig Dove, Childs, for Baltimore in 7; sch'r G. Heath, Fesckick, of Nantucket, just arrived from Machias.

The British brig Princess Royal, Forton, 69 days from Liverpool. July 29, in lat. 48, long. 36, spoke ship Foxwell, 17 days from N. W. York for Cork.

The British ship Britanni, Loyett, 14 days from D. gby. The sloop Dove was to sail for New York next day. Off the South Shoal of Nantucket, August 26, spoke the Squirrel Ingot, from Halifax.

The brig Mary, Parsons, 90 days from Corte. Was boarded in the Straits by several British men of war and treated politely. Off Maaga was boarded by two Spanish privateers, and robbed of water and stores. Coming through the Gut of Gibraltar in co. with several sail of Americans, was boarded by a Spanish privateer, and robbed of all the cabin stores, two casks of wine, and robbed captain P. of his clothes—the steward had a stroke made of him by a knife, 13 inches long. In lat. 36, 26, long. 8, 24, spoke sch'r Rebecca, Prince, 16 days from Leghorn for Boston—same day, ship Louisa Cecilia, Crocker, 20 days from N. W. York for Trieste. On the 13th July, Thomas Rees, the mate, stopped down in a fit and expired. In lat. 43, 26, long. 41, 50, spoke ship Two Brothers, Paul, 12 days from New York for Anstidion—who supplied captain P. with provisions. Lat. 43, 43, long. 85, ship Horatio, Johnson, 6 days from New York for Liverpool.

The sch'r New York, Cooke, 100 days from Messina, (Sicily) Trenchard at Gibraltar 16th June, for supplies, and left there sch'r Experiment, Clark, of Duxbury, from Villajuan, near Coronna, cleared for Leghorn, captured by an English cruiser, and condemned vessel and cargo, as carrying on the Spanish coasting trade; and brig Pembroke, Gardiner, of Beverly, from Gallipoli for Copenhagen, captured off Marseilles, and waiting trial. Spoke, June 19, off Cape St. Mary's, ship Alfred, Felt, 22 days from Salem for Messina. Next day, off Cape St. Vincent's sch'r Palladium, Wells, of Baltimore, for Madeira, on 34 days. August 6, on the Banks of Newfoundland, the Fishing sch'r Nine Sisters, Simmons, of Duxbury, out 6 weeks, had caught 450 quintals of fish. Next day, ship Maria, of New York, 15 days from New Orleans for Gottenburg. Same day, ship Ann, from Milford Haven for Newbedford.—13th, lat. 42, 50, long. 61, brig Dearborn, Macy, 7 days from Boston for Bayonne; supplied her with fire wood, lamp oil, and some stores. 15th, lat. 42, 80, long. 64, ship Columbus, Pettick, 9 days from N. York for Cadiz. 23d, lat. 40, 36, long. 68, was boarded by the British frigate Squirrel and treated politely. 26th, lat. 40, long. 69, 20, sch'r Fair Lady, 3 days from Portland, for Jamaica.

The sch'r Rising States, Newcomb, 3 days from Norfolk. The Richmond Packet, Lefort, was to sail in 4 days for New York.

ARRIVED, August 4.
The brig Georgia, Jocelin, 12 days fr. Savannah. Sailed in co. with brig Sea Island, Bennet, for New York. The sch'r Dolphin, Gale, was to sail for New York in a few days. August 30, to the southward of Cape Henry, spoke a sch'r from Charleston for Philadelphia, 6 days out. Saw a great many vessels on the coast. Passengers, captain Barker, lady and family, W. Clark, Messrs. Harvey and Hand, and Mrs. Pine. Benjamin C. Smith, died on the passage, after 7 days illness.

The sch'r New City, Meekins, in 7 days from Windsor, N. C. Captain W. saw a ship of war at anchor off the Hook, and saw her boat ashore at the light house—at 5 o'clock, she got under way and anchored in the bay—Captain M. supposes the ship carries about 32 guns, and she appeared to have French colors.

Stop the Thief.
One Hundred Dollars Reward,
FOR apprehending and securing in Baltimore jail, my apprentice boy, named JACOB VANFREL'S WACK, aged 18 or 19 years, about 5 feet 3 inches high; very stout and strong for his age; fair complexion, and good features; short thick brown hair, inclined to curl; his hands very large. He is a native of Holland, and was bound an apprentice to me on board of the brig George, of Baltimore, in the year 1800, at Rotterdam, from thence he made a voyage with me to Baltimore, and from thence to Amsterdam, and back to Baltimore in 1803. He was at school with Mr. Hargrove, where he remained for several months. He was always a thief, and finally stole a gold ring, and knowing that he would be flogged, he ran away from school, and entered in the United States navy, where he remained 2 or 3 years, and afterwards sailed 1 or 2 voyages out of New York, to Antigua, where he was impressed; and in a few days after, ran away from the British man of war. About the 20th of August, 1807, after being gone about 3 years, he returned, expressing much concern for his past conduct, and begged that I would forgive him and take him under my protection again; I consented, and boarded him with Mr. Hagen, on Dugan's wharf; and for 12 days he served as a porter in the store—And on the 2d August, whilst I was at breakfast, leaving the store in his charge, he availed himself of the opportunity, broke open my desk, stole 104 dollars, several silver table and tea Spoons, marked S, and a small brass pocket pistol, makers name, Ryan and Watson, London. Jacob can read a little, and sometimes attempts to write, but cannot make his letters plain enough to be understood; when he first came to this country, in 1802, I boarded him with Captain Geese on the Point, and he went to school a few months to Mr. Gardner. He speaks the English language very plain, and has but little of the Dutch dialect; I think that he has forgot the most of his mother tongue. If taken in this state and lodged in Baltimore jail, 50 dollars will be paid; but if taken out of the state and lodged in Baltimore jail, 100 dollars will be paid.
