ON application, in writing, to me in the recess of the court, as one of the associate judges of the sixth judicial district, in the state of Maryland, or John Baron, of the city of Baltimore, an insolvent-debtor, praying the benefit of the "act for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors," passed at November session eighteen hundred and five, and of the supplementary act passed eighteen hundred and six, on the terms mentioned in the said acts; a schedule of his property and a list of his creditors, on oath, as far as he can ascertain them, as directed by the said acts, being annexed to his petition; and I being satisfied by competent testimony that the said John Baron has resided the two preceding years within the state of Maryland, prior to his application; and the said John Baron, at the time of presenting his petition aforesaid, having produced to me the assent in writing of so many of his creditors as have due to them the amount of two-thirds of the debts due by them at the time of his said application.
It is thereupon ordered by me, that the said John Baron (by causing a copy of this to be inserted in some one of the newspapers in the city of Baltimore, every other day for three months successively, before the fourth day of November next) give notice to his creditors to appear before the county court at the courthouse, in said county, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, of the fourth day of November next, for the purpose of recommending a trustee for their benefit, on the said John Baron's then and there taking the oath by the said act prescribed for delivering up his property.
