Civil and commercial society repose many trials in him, the discharge of which are more important to appreciate his usefulness and merit than the writer of this article. The ecclesiastical community, of which he was a distinguished and ornamental member, and in which he occupied one of the highest stations, will long have reason to deplore the privation of his faithful services, his zealous exertions, and his unremitting devotion to its interests.

Both in public and in private life—both in a social and in an individual capacity,—there was a firmness, a consistency, a decisiveness, a perseverance, in him, which few possess. His resolutions were formed and he was true to them. One of them, and that not the least important, was, to be *constant* in *presenting* good, and rarely, indeed, could he in truth add, that lamentation over the abdication of the throne.

But it is enough. The virtues and ingenuous, whom the name of *constant* George Bulwer may attract to the pencil of this sketch, will easily bear comparison with any man's; but, however, they will sorrow as others do who have no hope.
