Upton Bruce being duly sworn on the Holy Evangelists of Almighty God, deposeth and sayeth, that among the servan's belonging to his father, (Normand Bruce) is a semale slave named Phillis, a dark mulatto; that at early age, she became the mother of two children, as was universally admitted, by a white man, named Andrew Ware. This fact was - never questioned, and Ware himself, never to my knowledge denied it. The children passed for, and were admitted to be his, and assumed his name—one was a boy, and being older myself than either of them, and brought up as it were in the same family, nothing like doubt rests upon my mind as to his birth and p rentage, I am as well assured of it as I can be of any fact of the kind, and no one that I heard, ever presumed to suppose otherwise. This boy was ra sed upon my father's farm, on Pipe Creek, at the mills in Frederick county, and being the child of a slave, was reared with the children of other slaves, and stood upon the same footing. His mother is still living, she it was that nursed him in his infancy, and she, he considered, acknowledged, and treated as his mother. When I engaged in the management of my father's property, which I did on reaching the years of manhood, this boy was then, about twelve or lourteen years old, and heremained along with the other servants until about the age of twenty, when, in consideration of his color, the regard I had for his father, (then dead) and the desire expressed by that father to have these children liberated, this boy was suffered to go at large, he promising to make some compensation, which never has been done. After leaving me, he was working about the country some few years, employed, sometimes as a waggoner, driving a team to and from Baltimore, until at length 1 learned, he entered on board some vessel and had gone to sea: and this life I had reason to believe he persevered in, until for some time past nearing nothing of him, I supposed it probable he might be dead. NAPOLEON. FRANKFORT, July 21,

The emperor Napoleon is comently expected in this city, where every thing is prepared for his reception. The Prince Primate arrived here yesterday from Aschast-nourg and again. let off this evening to go to meet his imperial and royal majesty, who is coming from Dresden where he made a thort flay. Divers momentous interests seem to have been settled on this occasion at the residence of the King of Sax ny. Several German Princes have fent ministers thither.

TILSIT, July 9. The exchange of the ratifications of the treaty of peace between France and Russia took place this day at 9 clock in the morning. At eleven the emperor Mapoleon, bearing the Grand Cordon of the Order of St. Andrew, repaired to the emperor Alexander, who rece ved him at the head of his guards, and having the grand decoration of the Legion of Honor. The emperor defired to see the soldier of the Rusian guard who had distingnished himself the most; he was presented to him. His majelly in testimony of the esteem he bore for the

The two emperors remained together for 3 hours, and then they mounted on horseback. They rode to the borders of the Niemen where th emperor Alexander embuked. The emperor Napoleon remained on the bank of the river until the emperor Alexander had reached the

The emperor Napo con has caused the Grand Cordon of the Legion of Honour to be presented to the Grand Duke Constantine, to Prince Kurakin, to Prince Labanoff and to M. de Bunberg. The emperor Alexander has given the Grand Order of St. Andrew to Prince Jerome Napoleon king of Westphalia, to the Grand Duke of Berg and of Cleves, to Prince Neutchatel and Prince of Benevento.

PHILADELPHIA, September 18. Extract of a letter from Boston, dated Sept. 15.

" the thip John Adams, 25 days from Liverpool, has just anchored-Alto, the thip Romeo, f. om London, in a thort passage; the Romeo will bring the latell news "-This letter which was closed at the departure of the mails says, that " no inteiligence had been communicated from either ships. Another letter, received by this morning's mail from Boston, is faid to state, that " the demands of the American ministers would not be complied with, and that a rupture between the United States and G. Britain was immediately expected.

The medium through which this intelligence is faid to be received, contradicts the information, as it is far from probable that, under such an expectation, ships laden with valuable cargoes would be permitted to leave England for this country.
