in the manner mentioned in the treats of peace" provides " for a joint survey of the northern part of that river;" and ugrees, that, "if on the result of such survey it shou'd appear that the said river would not be int. rsected by such a line," the parties will regulate the boundary in that quarter by amicable negociation.

The fifth article, after mentioning that or doubts had arisen what river was truly intended un'ter the name of the River St. Croix," provides for ascertaining that river, and the latitude and longitude of its mouth and source.

The sixth, seventh and eighth articles

have been execured.

The ninth provides for persons holding lands in the dominions of one of the parties who are subjects or citizens of the other; and the tenth is a stipulation in favor of moral honesty, viz. that neither party shall sequister or confiscate debts or property in the funds, &c.

The third article of the new treaty provides for and regulates commette between the United States and the British East Indies, in the same terms as the thirteenth article of the old neaty, except that the words, and suiling direct from the forte of the said states, are inserted in the first clause, which now runs thus: " His Majesty consents that the vessels belonging to the citizens of the United States of America, and sailing direct from ports of the said States, shall be admitted and hospitably received in all the sea ports and harbours of the British territories in the East Indies," &c.

The fourth article of the new treatvis the same as the fourteenth of the old one, and stipulates for a general liberty of trade between the United States and the Braish dominions in Europe.

The fifth article of the new treaty is the same as the hireenth of the old one. (regulating the duties on ships and merchandize), with two exceptions: The direct reserves to the United States the right previously reserved to Great Britain, of imposing a tonnage duty equal to what shall be imposed by the other party. The second is made by the substituting a new clause for the reservation formerly made by Great Britain, of "the right of imposing on American vessels entering into the British ports in Europe, zuch duty as may be adequate to countervail the difference of duty now payable on the importation of European and Asiat c goods when imported into the United States in British er American vessels." Instead of this, the following words make part of the new article. " And in the trade of the two nations with e ch other, the same duties on exportation or importation of goods or merchandi. shall be impused, and the same drawbacks and boun ties allowed in either country, whether the exportation or importation shall be in Initish or American vessels."

The sixth acticle of the new treaty flates that the parties cannot agree ab u' our trade to the British Well-Indies; but that while they will attempt an amicable agreement, both may exercife their existing rights."

The leventh of this, like the sixteenth of the other treaty, provides for the appointment of

By the eleventh article, citizens of the U States may carry European goods to the colo-Dies'of enemies of G. Britein (from the ports of the United States), provided that both veilel and cargo he bong fide American property, that the goods hall-have been unladen within the United States, and that (in addition to that pert of the duty already referred from the drawback on exportation) the further fum of one per cent, ad valorem on fuch goods shall be paid. They may also export from the U. States to Europe, the produce of colonies of the enemies of G. Britain, movided they, being neutral property, thall have been unladen as before, and that two per cent, ad valorem be paid on experiation in addition to what is referred on zhadrawback. After the expiration of the treaty, all aniecede at rights on these subjects afe


