Though a newspaper controversy cannot but  
be disagreeable to me, yet I am compelled to  
make the following statement of facts in order  
to vindicate both my private and professional  
character.  
On the 15th July, two gentlemen, whose  
names out of delicacy I omit mentioning, called

pect t the mortification of his English, who  
would have been at the highest pinnacle of joy,  
had he been me to link under the blow of this  
fencing master par excellent.  
My affair being thus settled to my entire  
satisfaction, I informed the parties concerned  
of my intention to state the particulars thereof  
in the public prints of this city, but at the Gen-  
tlemen's polite request, I forbear mentioning  
his name, which else I should certainly have  
done.
