A very unjustifiable attack having been made on an officer (not name!) of the 27th regiment, in the Federal Gazette of Puelday evening laft, I beg leave, through the medium of your more impartial paper, to flate the naked fast, unaccompanied, but by one remark on the publication in question. That the lense of the sommunication and the prompinels with which it is given to the pbulic, prove too clearly the hostile temper of the Gazette towards the 27th, and would give the public reason to believe that its editor would not be diffatisfied at any feas ble occasion of open attack or oblique instinuation on the conduct of its officers or privates. As this transaction is to be made the subject of enquiry by a Court Martial, there is an additi nal impropriety in the communication to the Gazette as it may tend to prevent a due impression being made on the public fentiment by the decision of the competent tribunal of my regiment. STATEMENT.

My orders were that each private should be furnished with ten rounds of blunt cartridges. A cording to the information I have received, it appears that a Mr. Collins, belonging to cap ain Miles's company, in purluance of thele orders, had recourse to a quantity of cartridges, left in his hand by a brother, now ablent in Ge rgia; and not cone wing they were charged with ball, madvertently put them into his cartridg: b.x. The young man has a good character; and I believe incapable of doing an injury to any person. When the carridges were dillributing Mr. Collins said that he was already supplied; the oilieer, therefore, palied him in the line, without any further enquiry-znd as the whole quantity required ran thort, Collins Supplied his rear rank man with a lew. The accident took place at the fecond fire, and upon learch being raude there were 7 remaining in his eastridge box. It mult, theretore, be obvious that the accident did not arile from "an unpardonattle neg igence" of any of my officers; as prematurey and incorrectly flated in the Guzeire.

With the concluding luggestions of the Gazette I heart ly concur.
