The reply on the part of the U.S. was commenced by Mr. McRae, who in a speech which corresponded with his great reputation as an orator, went into a full review of the evillence and displayed the combin'd effect, of the whole in very strong colours. He spoke from ter o'clock in the morning until the utual hour of adjournment.

Saturday, October 17. A Mr. Power from New-Orleans . [w'10]

turned out to be a subject of the King of Spain; was introduced by col. Burr as a witness by whom, [as he afferted] he intended to authens ticate certain papers, and to prove that general Wilkinson was in the habit of receiving money from the Spanish government. The avowed object of establishing this charge against the general was to impeach his credibility by contradicting some parts of his tellimony, and to thew that his motive for defeating the project of Burr was not patriotism, but to prevent an invasion of the territories of the King in whole pay he was himfelf.

This thrange affertion, which could fearcely be made without admitting that co. Burr's design was to attack the Spanish Territories, not merely in the event of a war, but immediately and at any rate; an affertion so meonsitient with the pretended fettlement of the Wathita lands, was repeatedly urged by Mr. Wickham, in the courle of a debate which ensued on the admissibility of fuch evidence, for the purpose of impagning the chara ter of wi nets, who had no notice of the charge intended to be adduced against him.

The Chief Juftice decided that the evidence was admissible, and that Mr. Power should be examined. He was therefore fworn, and queitioned as to what he knew concerning certain correspondence be ween the Baron de Lazon. delet and Gen. Wilkinson.

Mr. Power allressed the court with respect but firmuels, and declared that being a fubjest of the King of Spain, he could not, without violating his duty and him are, give an account of any political transactions which the service of the King his mail r required to be concealed. He stated that he had come hit er from New Orleans with great resultance; an agent of col. Bur who ferved a fubpocta upon him having threatened him with imprii nment in case he refated : but he hoped the court would not commit him to give the evidence which had been de nauded.

The counici for CA. Bur inflied that, whether he was a sprinch tooj ft or not, he was now within hop wer of the court, and ought to be compelled to diffe ofe whatever he kin w The Chief Julion decided in their factor, and required the withell to proceed with his teftimonv.

By the arrival of the brig Happy Couple at this port, we have received our regular file of the Paris Moniteur. from the 1st of August to the 4th of September, inclusive. The only article of importance from Denmark, which we notice at the first glance, furnishes intelligence from Copenhagen to tie 20th of August, and from the extremity of Zealand to the 22d of the same month. It is represented that the Danes had been successful in two sorties against the British on the 19th and 20th; that they commanded all the avenues leading to Copenhagen, together with such other positions as incommoded the British considerably in their approaches to the city, and compelled them to proceed with the utmost caution.

We understand that the captain of the Happy Couple reports that batteries were erecting by the Danes and Freach on both sides of the Great Belt, with the intention of acting against the British ships which guarded that passage, and that a French army of 50,000 men were ready to pass over to Zealand at the first opportunity, to compel the British to raise the siege of the Danish capital. Part of the suburbs of Copenhagen were reported to have been burnt by order of the Danish commander Peyman. We find this corrobbrated in our Paris papers, by an article under the head of Kiel,

Angust 21. The captain is also represented to state, that Bonaparte hail had a conference with the king of Spain on the con-

lines of his kingdom, and that the French althy of 40,000 men, collected in the neighborhood of Layonn hand marched for the reduction of Portugal,

The Monteur is sull of the projects of new laws relative to external commierce, internal trade and improvements, and a variety of minor objects all tending to shew the intefatigable industry of Bonaparte and his counsellors to render France as prosperous in peace as she has been in war. Several reports of reat lengths are given in official form, exhibiting the situation of the French empire in almost every point of view: The pictures drawn are calculated to flatter the vanity of a more sedate nation than the French, who are called by the orators of government the great and good peofile. It wil be impossible to publish these statements entire, but we shall from time to time give such extracts us will furnish the reader with a pretty correct idea of the. elforts of Napel on to raise the people over whom he reigns to the very pinnacle

of grandeur. Stralsund surrendered to the French under Marshal Srune on the 20th of Augue, the king of Sweden having become alarmed for his situation and fied to Rugen, leaving M. Peyron, one of his aid-de-camps, to make the best terms he could with the besiegers. The inhabitants were very much terrified when the French troops entered the town; but it does not appear that General Brune suffered any violence or disorder to take

Extrict of a letter from a gentleman at Bor leaux, to his fu her in this city, duted Schlember 8, 1807.

"The emperor of France leaves no stone unturned to ruin Great-Britain. There are at present no less than 100,000 men marchine through this place on their way to Pertugai.* I think Spain is included in their object; and shall be much surprized if the pre ent king is not dethroned. It appears that Lucien is to be king of Navarre, which will comprehend Biscay, Navarie, and Catalonia; Portugal to be given to Spain in lieu. It will not end there."
