MINUTE MEN.

On Thursday 1st the troops detached from the third Regiment, to compose a part of the levy of a hundred thousand men, in pursuance of a voluntary agreement of the officers and soldiers, paraded in Concord, under the officers detached to command them. Their appearance was truly martial. Every man was completely equipped and provided with every thing necessary for a campaign of six months. They were the very same sort of men as those who fought at Concord, Lexington and Bunker-Hill, in 1775, with the same enemy who have constantly violated our rights for the last 15 years, and now threaten us with a new war. They were animated with the same feelings and the same spirit. In view of the tombs of their fathers, butchered by the same hands that threaten them with a similar fate, their feelings were excited, by a sense of injury and insult, almost beyond the control of reason; but reposing full confidence in the wisdom and firmness of the government of their country, they waited patiently for its decision upon existing subjects of controversy; and when they shall receive order to march for the defence of the just rights of their country, they will demonstrate to the world, that the militia, in a government like ours, are not only our best security in peace, but our firmest reliance in the first moments of war. At three o'clock in the afternoon, they formed in line, with the Concord Artillery & Light Infantry companies, and marched through the town; after which the battalion divided, & a fictitious engagement to place, which was conducted with great skill and animation. Capt. Brooks, who commanded the detached troops, delivered to them a pertinent and appropriate address, in which he complimented them upon their military spirit and soldier-like appearance, and recommended to them, in the strongest manner, a close and constant attention to discipline. *Est.
