FROM LONDON PAPERS.

Expulsion against Madeira.—A force, it is said, is to be immediately dispatched from this country to take possession of Madeira. It is to consist, we understand, of 3000 men, to be commanded by Gen. Bessford.

The 3d, 25th, 34th, 84th, 91st, regiments are mentioned as being intended for this service.

A number of transports which are victualled for three months, have been ordered to assemble at Portsmouth, where the embarkation is to take place. The troops are likewise to be furnished with camp equipage.—A deputy adjutant-general, inspector of hospitals, two physicians, and two surgeons, are to be part of the fleet. This expedition is expected to sail in the course of next week.

The expedition, it is believed, has been resolved on as a consequence of intelligence received by government of the hostile designs of France and Spain against Portugal and its possessions. It is of importance not only to our ally, but to our East India and other ships which call there, that the island of Madeira should be preserved from the grasp of Napoleon.

A proclamation has been issued at Hamburg, prohibiting all English goods from being introduced into Holstein, unless they can be accompanied with original certificates that they are on neutral account, and are imported from neutral ports.

We understand that upwards of 10,000 men had volunteered from the militia regiments into the line before the first of September, the period at which the volunteering was to begin regularly.

The Danish government, it is said, was just on the point of concluding a treaty with France by which the latter would have obtained possession of all the naval force of the former, and the island of Zealand, at the moment our forces arrived.
