HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

MUNDAY, November 2.

Four other members appeared and took their scats.

Mr. Thomas aid, he had the honor to be appointed a member of the committee of Commerce and Manufactures. H. br heved it would be allowed by the members who know him, that he had never failed to perform any duty as it ned to him by the House, nor-shouldhea k to beex cused from serving on this commutee. were it not for this circumstance. At the t me the committee was appointed, the inamediate representative of the city of N. York was not present: that gendeman, said h, is now in his place, who b. sides being the representative of that important commercial city, is much better acquainted with questions of commerce than myself. He hoped the House would therefore grant his request. Granted, and on motion, Mr. Mungord was appointed in his place.

Mr. Gardner present d'he petition of Nathan Babbitt, of New-Hampshire, staeg that he served some time as a page sician in the military nospital at Provi dence, for which he had never rec wed compensation, praying renef. Referred to the committee of Claims.

Mr. Quincy moved that the petition of Paul Reverenne J. M. Revere, of Boston, (presented at a former session) be ow referred to the committee of commerce Red, Yellow, Green, and Black Morocco and manufactures. The petitioners are manufacturer, of copper, and pray that a duty may be laid on imported copper in sheets, in ord rto encourage the works established by them with great labor and expense. Agrect.

Mir. Quincey also moved that the petition of I somas Leach, Levi Tower, and 1b. Josef, owners of the schooner Phoenix. (presented at the last session) praying to be allowed a bounty on quantity of salt saved from said vesse!, which the Collector had refuse to allow, from some arregularity in the application, be referred to the committee of com merce and manufactures. Agreed.

Mr. Fish morad that the petition of William Kincaid presented at a former session, praying for compensation as a soldier in the revolutionary war, referred to the committee of Ciains. Agreed. Mr. Dureson moved that the jet u mof Robert Peters and others, respecting the titles to certain lots in the city f Washington, presented list session, and refer red to a select committee, who brought in a bul which was not acted upon, be now reterr d to a select co., mittee, with power to report thereon by bill or other-

Ur. Dana suggested the propriety of on thing the latter part of the reference. consising the committee to report by

Mr. Dawson consented to the alteration befeience was agreed to. moved that the letter from

President of the Senate, and Speaker a House of depresentatives of the state : N. York, inclosing certain resolutions of the legislature of that state, remine to the protection of the port and ... bur of the city of N. York, be referred to the comittee on that part of the President's message, which relates to the aggressions committed by foreign armed

vessels. Agreed to. the Speaker laid before the House the menabrial of Duncan M'Fariand of North Carolina accompanied by feveral documents, complaining of the undue election of John Culpepper, and praying that his feat may be vacated in his favor. - Reterred to the committee of Elec-

Mr. Cook. said that, in the year 1799, a port of entry was effablished for the port of Thomation, in the diffrict of Waldebrough. which had been found altogether unnecessary, and the money paid to the furveyor, was fo much loft to the U. States : He Should therefor- move the following resolution, to effect the purpose he had in view:

Resolved, That the Committee of Commerce and Manusadures be infiruded to enquire into the expediency of abolifhing the office of furve or of the port of Thomation, in the dittrict of Waldoborough, and that they report by bill or other wife. Agreed to.

Mr. Thomas moved that the bill which was before the House last session, on the subject of the Post Office and Post Roads, and which wa indefinitely puftponed, with the petitions which had been presented on that subject, should bh referred to the committee appointed to cone fider this lubjest at the pretent session.

Mr. Dana donbted the propriety of referring a vill of last session to any committee of this House.

Mr Thomas said that the Post Office Committee was empowered to report by bill or otherwife, that the bill proposed to be referred to them, was the report of a former committee, and a part of the unfinished buliness of 'all, session. The propriety of -thablishing different roads had been confidered; and it would probably save the present committee much trouble, to have that report before them.

Mr. Dana wished, if the gentleman had any precedent in view, that he would produce it. For his part, he believed the proposition perfeatly a novel one.

Mr. W. Aleton laid it would be improper to refer a bill of last session. What he enquired, would the committee do with a bill thus referred? They must disposse of it in some way. When a former report is referred to a committee, it may be made a part of the report of such committee; but they cannot make a bill of the last session a part of their report. The committer would doubtless catt their eye over the bill in question, without making any direct reference of it, and would make such use of it as they might think proper.

Extruct of a letter from a gentleman in Acre. Or. aus, to a gentieman in ship City, dated

" Tuccilay Morning, 15.h Sept. 1807.

"I have just time to inform you, that a mob under the direction of Col. Bilenas and McCarty, have last evening declared themselves independent, and are determined to resist our laws: it's rumoured that the povernor will send som gunboats 40 quiet this mob, which rumour I much doubt, as he is a mere cypher; it's an unfortunate circumstance for this country, that he does not possess energy and armness; how he can remain in a perfect state of apathy, and see his fell in countrymen deprived of th ir property, and see our laws trampied under foot by a during mob, withous taking any measures to suppress it, is truly astonishing. - Tho' this faction has not yet come to blows, we expect it this day, and may now be considered in a perfeet state of rebellion."

Such is the letter, which has led to so mu. h rumor and speculation in this city. for a lew days past. The writer has indeed used expressions calculated to excite some solicitude, but when correctly considered, this affair turns out to be litle more than a bubble.

The first thing which strikes us, is the date of this letter. If New-Orleans was actually in a a state of rebellion, in it to be presumed that we should not have received more satisfactory accounts of it, since the 15th of September? It is an old proverb, that ill news flies a-pace-But the following is, we understand, the true representation of this migaty rebellion:

The Mississippi, like other rivers, had formed by the gradual alluvion of earth a certain portion of land on its shores near the city of New-Orleans, which had been hitherto considered as the property of the King of Spain, and used as commons by the inhabitions of the city. This land was of almost indispensable us. to the city, as even almost all the earth which had been employed to rep ir and raise the streets was drawn from this source. The noted Edward Livingsto Lowever, prevailed upon the proprie or of the land contiguous to this ground to institute a suit fer these commons. The most learned council at the bar of orleans is associated in the assertion of this claim; E. Livingston no doubt was to participate in the profits of the recovery. The court decided in favor of the claimant. The next day or a icw days after, Mr. Livingston repairs to the spot to take possession or to exercise some of his newly-scquired rights of hovereignty. The people not used to the laws of the U. States collect in a mob under the direction of of the officers of militia, Belchas & M'Care ty; and Mr. i iving ston is forced to retire. The next day he returns; and the mob once more force him to fig. The report however is, that governor Claiborne has since quelled the mob, by assuring them that he will represent the ciscumstances properly to the government.

In confirmation of the above, we lay before our readers the following extract from a New-Orleans paper, of September 18; which is this moment put into our hands This paper takes no other notice of the transactions : BAITURE.

The following address was delivered by tho Gevernor on the 15th infl. to the people affembled on the Batture. Fellow Citisens, Permit me to claim your attention, and an

your governor and your friend to submit to your consideration a few observations. Whatever may be the redress desired, believe: me the m.de you have adopted is improper-It

cannot possibly avail you, and perfifted in, will injure yourselves and your cause. It is the duty of us all to yield submission to the flaws. The supreme court of the territory has prodounced this batture to be the property of Mr. John Gravier, and he and Mr. Livingston [who claims under Gravier] have been put peaceably in possession thereof by the Shee riff. The supreme court derives its authority from the government of the U.S. and its de-

crees muit therefore be obeyed. It is no less my duty than sincere defire, to promote by all the means in my power, the imterest of my sellow citizens. To the President of the U. 3. who expeds from me a faithful relation, of whatever concerns the wellate of this territory, I have already transmitted suck information as I could obtain relative to the conflicting claims to the batture, nor will 'I omit laying before him, such further representations upon the subject as may be furnished

The decision of the superior court is for the present conclusive !- It however dues not pres clude (in my opinion) all furthar enquiry as to the eight of property to the balture hut facti enquiry mult be commenced and conducted in Submission to the government and coulbrmably so the taws.
