Plan and View of New-Orleans.
A subscription is now filling for the plan of New Orleans, and its environs, with a perspective view of the city, designed by M. Bopeta de Wassy, Geographer and Engraver; the models of which have been presented to the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States, for their inspection, who have generally become subscribers, together with the President and Heads of Departments.
The plan of New Orleans and its environs with a perspective view of the city, designed by M. Bopeta de Wassy, Geographer and Engineer. The plan, on a scale of 31 inches by 21, exhibits the city of New-Orleans, with its suburbs, the adjacent country, Canal de Carondelet, so called after the governor who projected it, which conduits by means of the Bayou St. John that empties into Lake Ponchartraine, the intercourse between New Orleans, Mobile and Pensacola. An inspection of this plan presents to the intelligent eye, the facility with which the internal trade of this important peninsula may be rendered more prompt by means of canals intersecting with the Gulf and the Mississippi. The place of Canals, Barracks, Hospital, Mission de Vie, Government House and other principal edifices with the environs, extending six or seven miles about the city, are likewise correctly delineated as is a small geographical MAP of Louisiana, with the mighty Mississippi, and its numerous tributary rivers, defined to wait the calculation of the products of the Western waters to the future emporium of the Gulf of Mexico. A table of reference, embellished with emblematic devices elucidates the whole.
The perspective view of the city of New-Orleans on a scale of 26 inches by 12. The point of view has been very judiciously chosen at the lower entrance of the city at Fort St. Carlos, and afterwards a very picturesque coup d'oeil of the river Mississippi, the levee with the flapping in the harbor, and the principal street fronting the same. The elevation of the buildings show the style of architecture in the interesting city—a style very different from our own, but peculiarly adapted to a southern climate.
After a critical examination of the plan and perspective, we can truly assert, from personal knowledge, that they are drawn with a fidelity and correctness which do honor to the artist. We most heartily wish Mr. Bopeta every success, and respectfully recommend his labours to the patronage of the munificent citizens of the United States.

The following extract from Dictionnaire Encyclopedique shows the estimation in which it is held by the savers of Nature, being conformable to the description given.—(See vol. 18. p. 49.)
The Cassowary is nearly equal in size to the Ostrich, but its legs are much thicker and stronger in proportion. It is six feet and an half long from the bill to the end of the claws; the legs are two feet, and an half high from the belly. The head and neck together are a foot and an half; and the largest toe is five inches long. The wing is so small that it does not appear, being under the feathers of the back. The part which most distinguishes this Animal is the head, which though small inspires some degree of terror—it is bare of feathers, and armed with a helmet of horny substance, black before, and yellow behind. The neck is of a violet colour, and red in several places. The Cassowary has the head of a Warrior, the eye of a Lion, the defence of a Porcupine, and the swiftness of a Coursier. It can devour not only glass but even live and burning coals without the least injury, &c.
