E. but thick, hazy weather. On Tuesday the 3d, the wind veered more southerly, and increased considerable, accompanied with small rain, and dark disagreeable weather, which rendered it impossible to procure an observation; this weather continuing, the gale increasing, we' were carried by stress of weather between the Isla of Pines and Cape Corientes, on-Sunday morning at four A. M. at which hour the vessel struck on the W, end of Key Blanco and stranded. The report of the commitree concludes as follows: Resulved, l'hit it shall be lawful for the President of the U. S. to obtain by purchase a a reasonaprice, for the use of the public, the ex--clusive right to the System invented by Bir James Jay, and submitted by him to the executiv depaitment : provided, that in the opinion of the President it shall be o public utility and importance to possess the same. [The System here mentioned, is, the secret of preparing Symplathetic Ink, which is stated to have been of essential service during the revolutionary war.] After some discussion, the question was taken on agreeing to the resolution, and it was carried in the affirmative, aves 50, noes 48. The committee of the whole then rose, and re, orted their agreement to the resolution; and on the motion to concur, Mr. D. R. Williams, after remarking that the decision made in committee of the whole was novel and unprecedented, called for the ayes and noes: They were accordingly taken, and ther solution was agreed to, ayes 54, nogs \$3. The resolution was referred to a select committee for the purpose of

bringing in a bil.
