

Passeurs, Gual—Sugar and Coffee—Charles Gwin & Co. Left schooner Samuel & Jane, Kelly, for Savannah in 4 days. The private brig General Ernest and cutter Victor, from Guadalupe, landed some troops on the eastern end of the island of St. Bartholomew on the nights of the 11th and 12th November. The next morning the vessels proceeded round to the harbor, took possession of the forts and cut out the Swedish brig Meteor and schooner Random, which they took into Point Petre. It was also stated that they had brought a considerable quantity of Coal with them.

Also, sloop Nancy, Wardwell, 21 days from Point Petre, Guad.—Sugars.

The schooner Rapid, Gold, hence has arrived at La Vera Cruz.

New-York, December 7.

Arrived, British brig Betsey, Nucator, in 64 days from Dundee. On St. George's Bank, spoke a schooner from Rio Janeiro, for Boston—Nov. 30, off the east end of Long-Island, spoke the brig Panther, from the West-Indies, for New York, standing in for sound.

Brig Troy, Bogert, 23 days from Matanzas, Nov. 21, sailed with brig Friendship, Skelton, for Boston. Parted company on the 3d, and fell in with brig Industry, Howell, who had sailed the day before from Matanzas for Philadelphia. Next morning, at 4 A. M. saw the Industry aground on Florida Reef, with a signal of distress at her peak. Not being able to run in near her, the Troy lay off and on, and at 1 P. M. a boat came alongside for assistance. Capt. Bogert sent his boat and second mate, and with the long boat of the Industry, brought off all the people with their clothes and a few stores; the brig and cargo were abandoned, her rudder being knocked to pieces, and she expected to go to pieces every minute, surrounded as she was by sharp pointed rocks, which rendered every attempt to get her off ineffectual. The captain, second mate and four hands were brought to New-York in the Troy; the rest were put on board scir.—Hand, for Philadelphia, Nov. 23d, lat. 37° 22' long. 71° 30', spoke ship Commerce, Gray, 2 days from Baltimore for Lisbon. Experienced hard gales of wind from 17th to 20th November; and on Saturday cut one of her cables, and rode out the gale at Anboy. Lost two men at Matanzas, (Bassel Kennedy of Massachusetts, and Thomas Martin, a yellow man) killed by mixing vitriol with their liquor, which they mistook for essence of pepper.

Brig Ann Maria, Vermilia, in 26 days from Havana.

Brig Charlotte, Jones, in 27 days from Turk's Island, Nov. 22d, lat. 31° 37' long. 72° 40', spoke ship Isabell, Hector, 28 days from Liverpool, for Savannah.

Sch't Boston, Canterbury, 22 days from Boston.

Below last night, the brig Anna, Amazeen, (of Portsmouth, N. H.) from Point Petre Guadalupe.

A ship, a brig and 2 schooners. The brig is supposed to be the Hope, from Cork, to Levi Cost, as his private signal was up yesterday.

From a calm, the wind on Saturday morning at 2 A. M. set in from E. N. E. and blew a gale from about East all the forenoon—About 2 P. M. it got around S. W. and has, ever since, been a gale, varying from W. S. W. to W. and W. N. W. We have not as yet heard of any damage done on the water. The vessels which come up yesterday, slipped their cables.

The ship Tonquin, Fanning, from New York for Canton, was spoken Aug. 6 lat. 37° 58', E. 68 days out all well, in company with the English outward bound India fleet.

The brig Harvey-Hide, Dodd, has arrived at New London, from the West-Indies.

The ship Mary Ann, Morris, from Caienna for New-York, has arrived at Martha's Vineyard.

The ship Ariadne Humphreys, from Liverpool, for New-York has arrived at Saint-Wich (Cape-Cod) in a short passage. The ship Packet, Trott, arrived at Liverpool on the 19th Oct. in 22 days from Boston.

The ships Mount-Vernon, Lee; Mary Ann, Morris, both of Salem, from Calcutta; and brig Unicee, Foster, from Baltimore, have all arrived at Martha's Vineyard. The ship Mary-Ann is bound to New-York.

The ship Betsey, Washburn, from New-York for Oporto, has put into St. Michaels in distress, having lost her main and mizzen masts, threw over 200 bags of wheat and lost the chief mate overboard.

Brig Lydia, Sherman, from St. Pierre, Left October 28, sch't Eliza, Webb, or and for Philadelphia, in 10 days. Sch't Lively, Blake, out 12 days; sch't Whitney, Bockius, out 32 days; and sch't Triumph, Fallin, out 65 days, hence to Martinique, has not arrived.

Alexandria, December 3.

Arrived, brig Sally-Eliza, captain Bell 22 days from St. Bartholomews.

Nov. 27, lat. 27° 32' long. 70° 50', spoke sch't John, of Hudson, from Turk's Island, bound to N. York, lying to in a gale of wind; captain's name unknown, with the loss of all her sails but her foresail, had lost her boat off deck—the sea was running so high could afford her no assistance.
