What most particularly marked the rise and progress of civilization amongst the barbarous nations of Europe?

For a few particulars, I refer you to a memorial, presented to the levy court by those benevolent men, the visitors of the prison, now in the hands of Justice Gorsuch; which memorial, I hope, will not be withheld from the public; as well as a report of the steps the court thought proper to make, to remedy the evils therein mentioned, and alleviate the distresses of the prisoners; also, to a small pamphlet I published a short time since.

Once more beg leave to remind ANON, that he has neglected to fulfil the Annonation imposed by my publication on the American of the 7th Nov. and that, for his sake, I feel mortified, as his talents and station in society are, beyond doubt, respectable.

Republicans!

To what part of the world can we fly to enjoy the greatest blessings that can be bestowed on man, on earth, civil and religious liberty, if we permit our glorious constitution in this world, to be overturned? The admiration of all good men, and the dread of the wicked.

I offer myself a candidate for the office of Sheriff, at the next election—Read the following conditions—they are truly republican:

I will not solicit a vote, nor buy one with a glass of grog. The man that solicits or sells a vote, is equally unworthy of the freedom of the United States.

As I am a stranger amongst you, I do not harbor myself with success. If you reject my offer, let an American step forward!—If you accept it, I pledge my life, that I will put an end to the tyrannical and misery that nearly overwhelm us.

4th. I will paste up in each room, a copy of the regulations the benevolent visitors of the prison may recommend, for the benefit of the prisoners; and will cause them strictly to be adhered to.

5th. I will pay annually to each committee appointed to visit the poor-house and hospital, \$500, to purchase such necessaries the inmates stand most in need of.

6th. I will allow a handsome salary to a humane and independent attorney; whose duty shall be—to endeavor to settle amicably the disputed accounts of the avaricious creditor and honest poor debtor and stanger; if unsuccessful, to defend their cause gratis—visit the prison, and aid me in the strict performance of my duty.

7th. I will pay a sum annually to the editor of a newspaper, to be entitled "The Maryland Republican Centor, and The Poor Man's Friend" in which, shall be inserted, the just complaints of the honest poor man, gratis. It will also serve as a check to tyranny, by exposing the iniquitous conduct of every man—all true republicans will subscribe to it.

8th. I will rent a house in town and another on the Point, in which, rooms shall be comfortably furnished for the reception of such debtors as wish to remain a reasonable time, to consult their friends and make arrangements with their creditors. The same shall be paid to the committee and benevolent visitors of the prison; to form a fund for the education of the children of the poor gratis—and the said committee and benevolent visitors of the prison, shall be requested to establish the schools, and take the children under their protection, for which they will receive the grateful thanks of all true republicans and good men. 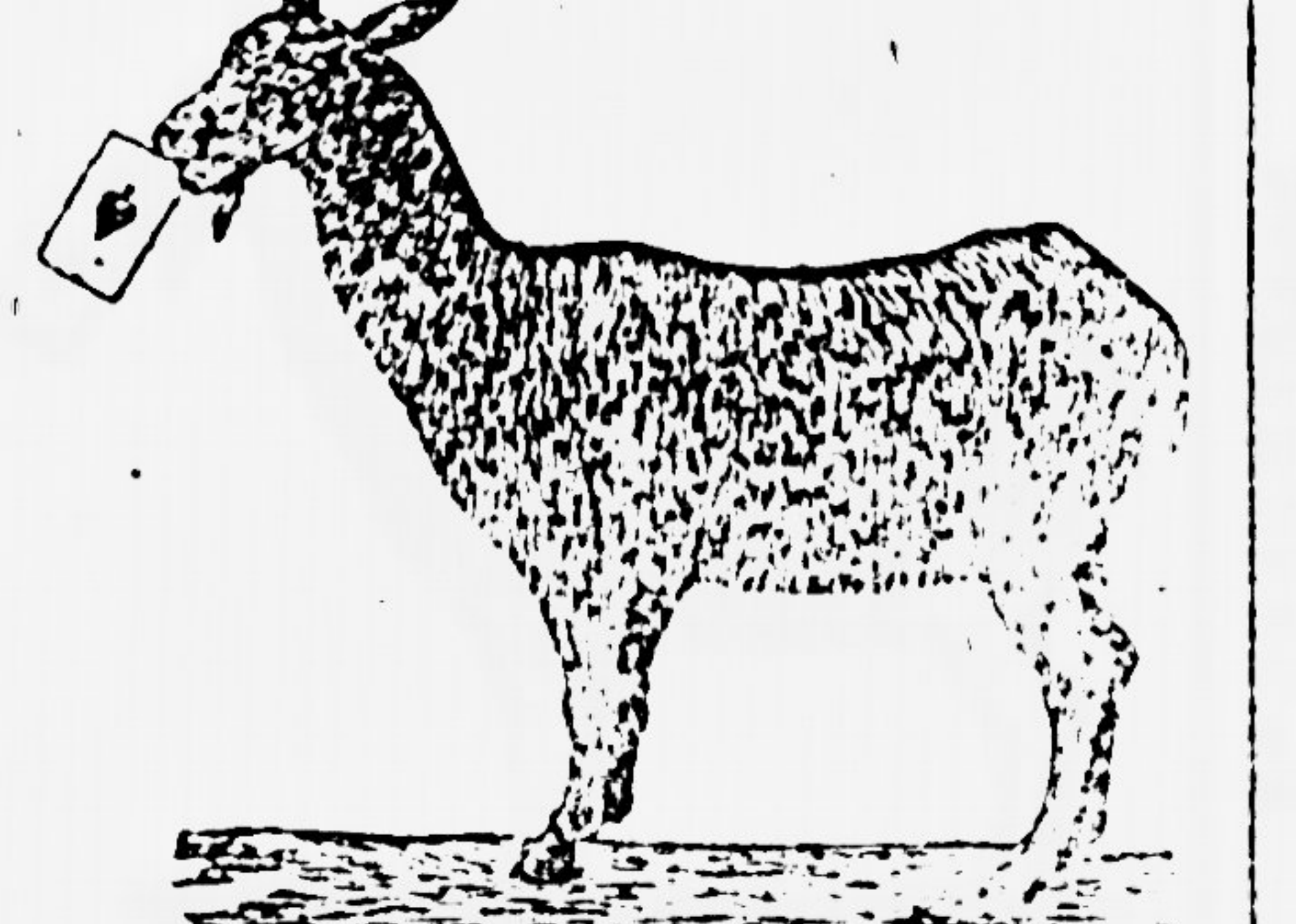
