The Day before, one Nehemiah Baldwin, with two others, were apprenenced there by Order of the Governor in Council, for being concerned in a former-Riot, and committed to Jail: In the Morning one of them offered to give Bail, and the Sheriff for that Purpole took him out, in order to carry him to the Judge; but on their Way thither, a great Number of Persons appeared armed with Cudgels, coming down from the back Settlements, who immediately rescued the Prisoner in a very violent Manner, contrary to his own Defire: Upon this the Sheriff retreated to the Jail, where he raifed 30 Men of the Militia, with their Officers, in order to guard it; but by Two o' Clock in the Afternoon the Mob being increased to about 300 strong, marched with the utmost Intrepidity to the Prison, declaring that if they were fired on they would kill every Man; and after breaking through the Guard, wounding and being wounded, they got to the Jail, which they broke open, fetting at Liberty all the Pritoners they could find, as well Debtors as others, and then marched off in Triumph, using many threats. ening Expressions against those who had affixed the Authority.
