the Rebels, or their Affistants, in any Part of Great-Britain or 'Ireland, until the Rebellion be suppressed.'

Edinburgh, Dec. 26. We are well assured that the Highland Army at Perth is not near so formidable as has been remesented. They have stopped all Passes to prevent Defertion, and are fortifying the South Inch at Perth, by bringing the

River to furround it. From the Western Parts it is assured. That a noble Spirit prevails, and the whole Country is rifing with a Resolution to fight wherever there be Occasion; they have already been furnished with several .1 mentalities stand of Arms.

The Betender, in a Council of War held lately with his chief Officers, declared he thought kimself very ill used by many in Great-Britain, having, under their Hands, repeated Fremises of their Assistance upon his Arrival, with Purte and Person, in Behalf of his Cause; the Disappointment of which occasioned him to express himself with great Warmth, in being fo much deceived. On which Occasion the Duke of Perth, and some others, said, that they were much worse used in their Undertakings, having had Affurances from Franca of being aided with 10,000 Men, and by Spain with 6000; which Promises engaged him, and many others, in the present Undertaking, to the Hazard not only of their Lives, but the Ruin of their ramilies for ever.
