The SPEECH of his Excellency Thomas Bladen, Efq; Governor and Commander in chief in and over the Province of Maryland, at the Prorogation of the General Assembly of the said Province, on Tuesday July 8, 1746.

Gentlemen of the Lower House of Assembly,

OU may always affure yourselves of my being greatly pleased with automated to tion you thew, of Loyalty to his Majesty, and Compliance with his Royal Commands; but certainly the Act passed this Session, for sublisting and conveying the Levies, would nave been more agreeable to his Majesty's Directions, of raising as many as we could,

if the Bounty had not been confined to three hundred: And I should have found it more practicable to conform to his Majefty's Order, in providing Cloaths for such Men, if you would have concented, any surplus-Money, anore than what was ne-re ary for the express Purposes of that Act, might have been made use of for such Occasion of Cloaths, to be replaced by the Allowance directed by his Majesty to be made by General St. Chir: Nor do I understand why this Surplus was refused by you, to be applied to so necessary a Purpose as cloathing the Proops; when such an Application would have been only lending, for the Good of the Service, Part of the Money gives.

At the same Time that I take this Opportunity of desiring you to be fatished of my never having entertained the least Thought of infringing your Privileges in any Respect, I must ello acquaint you, that I very heartily with some Reports of a new and dangerous Doctrine (viz. The more Confusion, the better,) which in no Sense can be allowed to be within the Priwilege and Freedom of Speech, may prove groundless; and that I may never be forced, by the Duty of my Station, to the disagreeable Necessity of taking Notice of any Words spoken in your House, which no Rule of Parliament can privilege.

Gentlemen of the Upper and Lower Houses of Assembly, As I have now, on my Part, passed all the Laws offered me this Session, I hope you will, on your's, do every Thing for promoting the Peace of your feveral Counties, and a due Ob-Servation of the Laws.

I have, by the Advice of his Lordinip's Council of State. thought fit to prorogue this Assembly to the first Tuesday in November next; and you are to take Notice, that you are proregued to that Day accordingly.

PETERSBURG, April 5.

HE Troops of the Empire are marching from all Parts into Livonia; and there are already in that Frovince near 30,000 Mon. There has been fent to Riga a confiderable Train of Artillery, and more are ordered thither. The irregular Troops, Cossacks, and Colmucks, which are drawn from the Ukraine, are arrived in Livonia, and canton'd on the Frontiers of Poland.

The Reason of these warlike Preparations is two-fold; the one, from a certain Knowlege of a Treaty being entered into between Psussia and Sweden; the other, a Treaty between our Court and that of Vienna; which the first is made to oh me the Effects of, and me fall upon Livonia, in case our Troops should march into Germany. But, as we are now perfectly acguainted with the Views of a certain Court, we have taken care to be so well prepared, that we can, if Occasion requires it, march 40,000 Men into Germany, and have fufficient to punish Sweden, or any of her Allies that shall presume to interiors with our A awa,
