The STEECH of his Excelling WILLIAM SHIRLEY, Fig. revived by fresh promises from Canada and France, and whilst to the General Asiembly of the Province of the Manachusetts—a most ravaging tickness prevails among the Cope-Sable and Lay in New England, held at Boston on Friday, one 7th Day St. John's Indians. 67 November, 1746.

Gertlemen of the Council, and House of Representatives, Uring the receis of the court, I have received two packets from lieutenant-governor Majearene; in the former of which he in orms me, that the three companies, which I first sent from nence to remforce the garrifon under his command, upon the late intelligence or a large body of Calmidians being all mond at Minas, and the appearance of a French fleet upon the coast of Nova Section, had enabled him to act offerfively against the enemy, and desires such a further reinforcement from New England, as would make up the whole 1500 or 2000 men; and in the latter, which was lowarsed to me in his mojett,'s thip Chefier, lately arrived from the balon of Anno polis, ne advites me of the French fleet's having quited the coast, and the Gun dauns being decamped and retiring from Annapolis, with a defign of leaving a party to wilter in Schiegneeds, and that the reinforcement which he had received from me, together with the Chefter fent him by admiral W. r.n from hence, and the Shirley frigate by admiral tocommind from Leuifturg, had been in a great measure the support of the garrison. Upon receiving the first of these packets, I forthwith ordered ave more companies to be embark'd as from as magnit be for Annapolis, and in concert with admiral Warren applied to governor Wentworth and governor Green to send a real forcement shither from their respective governments, and accordingly the former of 'em caused two companies to be immedially embar-ked from New Hampfoire, and the other three from Rhode-Island; and notwithstanding the departure of the Franco fleet, and decam; ment of the Canadaans, I have proceeded, with the advice of his majetly's council, to forward the reinforcement which I had ordered for Annapolis, before the arrival or the last intelligence from thence; they being of opinion with me, that Mr. M. frarene may be thereby strengthened this Fail, to take or destroy the enemy's magazines of warlike mores and provitions, which most probably they have left behind them at Airmas or Schigmers, and fecure all the grain and fatting cattle which is not necessary for the present subsistence or the inhabitant for his manifest of the inhabitance. tants, for his majerty's tervice; by the first of which the maiecontents among the inhabitants would be left without arms or ammunition, and the enemy be disappointed of what stores they may expect to find upon their return next year; and by the latter, the country left without subfiftence for the Canadaans or Inai ns next of ring; to drive off that party of the evemy which is defign'u to winter at Scingnicio; to centroy, or at least to harrate the legiars; to call such of the inhabitants to an account as have appeared in arms against his majerty's garrison, or ma nateatly need a traitorous correspondence with the enemy; destrey the fettlements of such of them as shall abscord, and lay the inhibitants in general under thronger ties of allegiance and dity to his majetty; whereby it would be rendered extremely difficult, if not impracticable, for an enemy to make any confidetable progress in the country next Spring to the disadvantage of the garrion, and a foundation might be laid for a lasting security to his majetty's government, by putting a refraint on the future conduct and behaviour of the inhabitants: For doing all which, this feems to be the critical conjuncture, whillt the Nova Scotians are chagrin'd and dispirited at their late disappoint-

ment from the French, and before their deladed hopes shall be

In the mean while, Gentlemen, it must be a sensible pleasure to you to reflect now much the teatonable fuccours fent from hence have already contributed to the prefervation of Nova S.otia from it's a e impending da ger; the great value and importance of which province to the crown, and all the English colonies upon this continent, as their barrier against the French, you are so well acquainted with, that I need not apprize you of it. And I doubt not but you will be always animated with a proper spirit for succouring it in any suture emergency, which may require your aid.

Until min of the Council, and House of Representatives, The season being too early for the Winter session to begin, and your affairs in the country being not yet, as I apprehend, quie mithed, I thall detain you from 'em no longer than the public cutines, which requires a present dispatch, obliges me to do.

Gentlemen of the H wie of Reprosentatives,

The three principal matters which call for your immediate confideration i., to make provision for detraying the charge of the works at Cafile William and Governor's Gland, an estimate or which I laid before you at your last meeting; and if any further charge, then unforeseen, has arisen, I will order the account of it to be forthwith communicated to you. The lengthening out the establishment for oilleting the soldiers rais d for the intended expedition against Canada, and providing for the province's quota of the articles necessary to be surnished for carrying on the expedition against Crown Point, according to the settlement made at Albany in concert with the commissioners attending there on the part of this province, and which has been likewite laid before you. With respect to this expedition, I have done every thing on my part towards forwarding it; the fitteen hundred men destred by you to be reserved for the service of it are ready, according to the lifts returned to me by the respective officers, to proceed; and with the advice of his majetty's council, I have ordered a thirteen inch mortar, with it's carriage and implements, belonging to his majetty's cattle William, and one hurdred shells, with a proper proportion of fuses taken out of the province stores, to be sent round in transports to Husjon's river, which the advanced feafon of the year required to be done without delay, and were necessary to be fent from this province for the service of the expedition, in case it shall proceed, there being no ordnance stores of the like fort and weight of metal to be had (as I am in:orm'd) from any o--battering ther of the colonies concern'd in the expedition;and other cannon will, I expect, be supplied from New York. And I have likewife, with the advice of the council, fent round with the mortar, and other warlike stores, fixty-two barrels of gunpowder out of the province's flock (which quantity is allotted by the before mentioned settlement for the quota of this province) with tuch orders as you will perceive I am advited to in the vote of council, in case this application of the before-mentioned stores for the service of this expedition shall not be approved of by you. Whatever, Gentlemen, remains further to be supplied on the part of this province towards sitting out this expedit on depends upon you.

Gentlemen of the Council, and House of Representatives, I have received advice from one of your agents for profecutirg your petition to his majetty for obtaining a reimburtement of your charges in the late expedition against Cape Breton, that the right honourable the lords of the committee of council, to whom the confideration of that matter was referred, were pleaf-
