After having received one, which gave an account of many ad vantages gained by the garrifon of Bergen op zoom over the befiegers, of the g eat pienty they enjoy in that city, and of the difficulties Count Lowendahi had to escounter, and the fearery that there was of all necessaries in his army; he gravely faid at the king's table, before all the Generals, I am very ferry for poor Count Lowendahl. His Majerty looking at him carriefly, faid, Why are you forry for him? Does he want People? No, Sir, answered the Duke, he has too many by half. How is that, replied the King, laughing? However, if it is fo, I will give you his command and 10,000 men more, provided that you will engage to take Bergen cp. 200m by the igth of September, that I may then be at leilure to return to Paris. To which the Duke replied, Notwithfia ding the Incli-nation I have to acquire glory, I cannot accept of the offer, became I should fail in the attempt, as will plainly appear by these papers: At the same time taking out of his pocket the Hague Gazette, with some others, he asterwards went on and faid, You will there fee that the army of M. Lowendahl wants bread, beer, and even water. The Gezettes were actually read, as which the King and the Lords at table were very much diverted; and then said, If this is true that my troops want neceffaries, they will acquire great glory in taking Bergen op 200m, whilst the enemy never goes to fight without their belies full of beer, wine and geneva.
