hours they retarted home with light hearts and a loaded boat. Whis etabled him to acd falt to his flere, and by degrees, fuch a num er of bouts and necessary materials, as rais'd him from tie degree of a poor parion, to that of an eminent merchant. Gain produced an emulation among the people, who should be most modificus. The clergyman divided the profits fairly, and orther a correspondence with the merchanis at Cork, who 100% off all the min as fall as they could cure and barrel them. By this means, the poor village of Bantry grew gradually into a handrome town, filled with artificers and tradelmen. When the clergyman had brought his defigns to this happy period, he left tre future cordent to his fon, and betook himself to the more pecu iar care of his flock; and at length having succeeded far bejord his hopes, banish'd ignorance, incolence and poverty, and continued in their flead, religion, inclustry and wealth, he left this world for a better; and his fon one of the most current merchants in Ireland...... I have only to add, most consent merchans in Heldale fith that glorious project now that this thory gave the first hint of that glorious project now on toot, for chabitant the White Herring Fishery.

N. E. W. Y. O. R. K., August 13:

Extrall of a Latter from Haiffux, dated July 22, 1750. which is about one rundred miles up in the country, where I have been fince the 6.h of April, and am return'd but yeller. cay: We went from hence with about 400 men, in order to take perfeition of the lithmus, which is between the Bay Verte, and Bay handy; but when we came there, behold we found all the Indian of the river St. John's, all the Mickmack tribes of lediant, in number about 700, with the same number of disaffeeled French inhabitants, and about 200 regular troops, ready to receive us, making in all about 1000 fighting men, and their fituation fo good, that if we had had an equal number to theirs, we should have found it a difficult matter to have dislodged them; therefore we thought it most prudent to cefer the attempt of taking possession, until a more savourable opportunity, (which I hope will not be long e'er it happens.) If we get poiout of the power of all the Indians in America to diffurb us; tho' we do not get it this sammer, yet we shall the next.

About 15 cays ago I had a hard bruth with a body of the rebel French, and about 50 Indians, on the Cobiquid fide of the bay of Miras: I endeavour'd to surprize them in the night, but the black-arles kep: too good a guard, and I was dilappointed in this attempt; however I attacked them about half an hour after day break, with one hundred men with me; and tho' they were very well posted in a thick wood, yet after our second fire they quitted it, and fled to the village de Bourke which was just near them, thinking to keep possession of it; but we sushed on them and beat them from thence, setting up the Indian howl after them all the time we chased; a great many of them may thank their heels for their lives; we killed many of them may thank wounded many; and we had but three of them, and I believe wounded many; and we had but the man killed, and none wounded.——We have built a one man killed, and none wounded very fine fort in the heart of the country, (tho' we were intertened to be devour'd before we could get it half firish'd) which commands the river st. Croix and Diziquid, and overcoks seven villages: The land about the fort, and where the villages are, is extremely rich; all the inhabited lands in the back parts of this country is extremely fertile, and fituated near five navigable rivers, in which rivers the tide rifes at full

Moon about fifty or fixty foot.

PHILADELPHIA, August 9.

By late advices from England, we are assured, that on the 15th of May last, after a hearing of fix days, in the cause depending in the high court of chancery, between the honourable the proprietaries of the province of Penniylvania complainants, and the right honourable the lord Baltimore, proprietor of the province of Maryland, defendant; wherein the complainants demanded the specific performance of an agreement executed in the year 1732, for running two lines as boundaries of Penntylvania and the three lower counties; the lord chancelfor, after declaring that he had not taken time to confider the matter from any doubt on which fide the equity of the cause lay, but as it was an affair of great extent and consequence, to view it in all its parts, decreed, That the agreement sublisted, and was obligatory on the parties; That they should with-in three months sign commissions to seven persons, who, or any three of them, should have authority to run the lines according to the agreement; and particularly directed in the decree, That effectually to inforce the execution of the decree, and avoid unfair proceedings, the cause should be left open, for

the more easy application of either party, as in the tause, for recieis; and that the defendant should pay the plaintiffs charges, occasioned by the defendant's commissioners endeavouring to violate the agreement, the expences of executing the com-million to examine witnesses in America, and all other costs in

ANNAPOLIS. Since our laft, we have collected some further Account of the Spanish Fleet, which met with bad Weather at Sea, and were, some of them, forced into Norfolk. We are assured that whole Fleet, which less the Hawania, consisted of three Galleons, four Register Ships, one Brigantine, and one Sloop, under Convoy of one Spanish Man of War of 50 Gurs: They were parted at Sea by bad Weather. One of the Gaileon, a Register Ship, and the Sloop, are at Norfele, and have brought in a vast Sum of Money; the Galleon had 350 Chests of Dellars on board, and a great Quantity of Cocnincal, Engar, Incige, Cocoa, and Dying-Wood: One Passenger on board het had 200,000 Dollars, and a great Quantity of Diamores. They lost all their Mass, and flung over all their Guns, which were 40, at Sea; and when she came into Norfolk, had foer-teen Feet Water in her Hold. The other Ship belongs to the Portugueze, her Cargo consisting of Cocca, Cockineal and Money: having 600,000 Dollars register'd, and a great Quantity besides. The Brigantine, as we mentioned before, we lost; but all, or the greatest Part of her Money saved. The Man of War, called in English the Greybound, commanded by Capt. Cancil, an high Gentleman, after losing all her Man, Budder, and Capt. Rudder, and Guns, at Sea, drove aftore on Metchegang, Snoais, off Worceffer County, in this Province, with 7 Fen Water in her Hold; where she now lies a Wreck. After & firuck, the People hoisted out her Boats, but they flore a. long side, being about a quarter of a Mile from the Shore; as. ter which they made a Raft, on which they brought a good ceal of M.ney ashore; but two Men, and two Chests of Money, were wast 'd off and lost; and two other Men, attempting to swim afnere, had tied so much Money round their Walli, that they funk with it, and were drowned. The Captain has red two Sloops to carry his Men, and what Money they cons fave, round to E. north in Finginia.
