What those instructions are, we learn from the Amsterdam Gazette, which lays, that Mr. Keen is ordered to make strong Representations to the Court of Madrid, about the English Ships lately taken by the Spanish Guarda Costas in America, as it appears, upon Erquiry, that most of them were drove by Strefs of Weather upon the Spanish Coails, and confequently could not be feized according to the Tenor of former Treaties, &c. But why was any Thing left undetermined between England and Span in the definitive Treaty? Why did we not conunce the War with the Spaniards, when we found them not fincerely inclined to Peace? The Auswer to these Questions is too obvicu : It may, in two Words, be jumm'd thus; that a Continuance of the War would have unhinged the System of ty and Correction which has so long prevail'd; the Rope was firetch'd to the utmost that it could bear; and Monev could not be found to answer ail Demands, both Abroad and at Home, &c."

In the Boat were 47 Han's, whom I took on board, and after 10 Days arrived fale here, tho' our Provisions were confidenbly exhausted .- In the Boat were Mr. Martin Muste, and two Children belonging to Mr. Pi ts on the Shore.'

A Letter from Mr. Enoch Titcomb, dated at Newburg,

January 10. On Monday the 7th Inflant the Sloop Dolphin, bomd from Rhode Island to Boston, Simeon Mirick, Master, was crove ashore on clumb Island in Newbury, in a violent storm, and the Sloop wreck'd, the Cargo mostly faved, which confisted chiests of Tar, Turpentine and Provisions: The Maiter Simeon Mirick, the Pilot John Sauler, and Bengish Bill were froze to Death after they got on Shore: One Mai's Life was laved, who lays the Stoop belongs to Mr Thomas Noyes of Stonington. The dead Men were decenly buned this Day."

The People thereabouts, feeing Nobody in the Veffel, went on board the next Day, and found no Soul there. By the Maragement of the two Men who left her, it is supposed that they have murdered the Mafter and Crew, or elle im away with the Veffel; but the former feems most probable, is there were some small Spots of Blood on the Deck, and on some Cloath, which were found in her, and as she is ciscoreed to be the same Schooner which us'd to Trade into that Part from Corry Point in Pirginia, one ly Mailer. She had on board a confiderable Quantity of Ciocolate, about a dozen Bottles of Spanish Snaff, some Barris of Turpentire, and fundry other Goods; and a Pair of loads Piffols lay in the Cabin. The two Men who left her, and go by the Names of Newton and Jones, we are informed at gone towards Philadelphia, and have a Pass figu'd by facer Magnificates in this Province. An Express from St. Mary'n juit from up with the above Account, and we hear a Huand Cry will be immediately sent after them.
