Extral of a Letter from a Gentleman in Kingston, Jamaica, to

bis Friend in Philadelphia, dated January 2, 1750 1.

You may, probably, e'er now, have heard of the unbappy Fate of the Doctors Williams and Behnet here: But as the Motives which induced the Quarrel, may not be known to you and others in Philadelphia (the constant Subject of Conversation on amongst us) I send you the following Account, which may be depended on. Dr. Williams; about six Months ago, published da Essay on the Bilion: Fever of this Island; which, the indeed not so complent a Performance as might have been expected from a Man of Learning and Experience, yet was full of just Reasoning, and proposed a Method of Cure in general good, and supported with that strongest of Arguments, great Success in Practice. Dr. Bennet, a Gentleman born at Mont. ferrat, had his Education in Great Britain, commenced Physician in France, and came to Jamaica, not above three Months before Dr. Williams's Essay was printed; soon after the Publication of which, Dr. Bennet gave us a Pamphlet, intinted, An Enquiry into the Essay, &c. It consisted chiefly of Ridicult, discover'd little of the learning of its Author, a. d (I need not fay) was not founded on Experience. Dr. Williams neglected the Enquiry for a confiderable Time, but at length published in the Courant a Poetic Epifile, addressed to Colonel Price; in which, among other severe Lines against Bennet, are the foilowing:

Unbappy NORTOR fell beneath his Skill, The first Attempt, alas! be made to kill.

After this feveral Pieces were published in the Courant, particelarly a Letter by Benner to the Author of the Verles andref fed to Colonel Price. Williams, after fome Time, published a Letter to Bennet in which he proved, by the Tellimony of others, many gross Falsines in Bennet's; and this he did in a Manner that Justice to his own Caaracter feem'u to require. I shall not (nor indeed will Time allow me) to trouble you with a Detail of the many Circumstances of this Affair. Provok'd by fome Paffager in Williams's Letter, Bennet on Saturday went to Williams at a Store in Kingfon, and calling him afide, en-deavour'd to throw a Box of Souff in his Eyes; upon which a Scuffle enfred, and Williams got the Advantage. A Magustrate therenpon (fuspeding the Consequence) sent for Williams, but did not bind him over, taking his Parole of Honour that he would not accept a Challenge, if Bennet should offer one, nor would fight a Duel with him, if he could avoid it. In the E vening of the same Day, two or three Challenges, without Name were sent to Dr. Williams, who did not think proper to take Notice of Papers unsubtanibed. The next Morning, between four and five a Clock, feveral Persons (it is faid three) whereof Bennet was one, knocked at the Door of Dr. Williams's House, but were otherwise so filent, that tho' Williams several Fimes called to know who they were, he received no Aniwer; upon which, taking his Pistols with him, he went down, and exented the Door, and feeing three Persons discharged one of the Pistols, which was loaded with Pidgeon Shot, amongst them, and presently the second; but neither of them did any perceptible Injury: Then they went on the other Side the Street, Williams followed, and Bennet and he drew their Swords, and ofter fome Paffes, Wiliams entered Bennet on the right Side, and came out of the left; whereupon Bennet fell, and Williams immediately received a Wound, which entered at the upper Part of the left Breaft, and came out at the right Shoulder Blade, of which he instantly died: But from whom he receiv'd this Wound, is Matter of great Speculation and uncertain Conjecture, occasioned by the Manner in which it was given. Bennet survived two Hours, in which Time he did not reproach Williams with any ungenteel Conduct; neither have I heard of amy Wound by Ball (as it has been reported he receiv'd) difcovered on Bennet's Body. Many white People were Spectators of this tragical Scene, who did not offer to interpole. Accounts of the Matter are very various, and each has differed from himself fince the Time it happened. The Negross, who were present, give strange Accounts of it. Upon the whole, it is the prevailing Opinion that Williams was deliberately mfrom the Manner in which he was killed, and the Sword hav ing never appeared, with which it is faid the mortal Wound was given. This Affair has added to the well known Heat of Parties here, some taking up the Defence of Bennes's, and o-That it may not be produc-ifh of Yours &c. thers of Williams's Conquet .tive of more Mulchief, is the wilh of, GREOLIUS.

N N A P'O L I'S

We hear that Sarab Bevers was lately tried at the special Court in Cacil County for the Murder of her Bastard Child, and found Guilty.

The two Negro Women condemn'd-at our last County Court, are to be Executed here on Friday next,

On Monday Evening last the Dwelling House of the Widow Wooden, near West River, took Fire, occasioned by a Cardle falling among some Coston or Flax, and burns down to the Ground, with almost every. Thing in it.

the Man mentioned in our last to be found marder'd in Baltimore County, was prov'd to be, (as was suppos'd) Denald M' Kennie, Mr. Digger's Overleer, and the Person suspected to be the Murderer is Daniel Sullivan, an Iris Convid, who was taken up in Cacil County, and is now brought to Town, and in our Goal, in order for his Trial.

This Day came on before the Honourable the Judges of the Provincial Court now fitting, the Trial of Jeremiah Soift, who murdered two of his Master's Chi'dren at Elk Ridge, in this County, on the 14th of March past, and knocked down and almost kill detection. He was at work in the field with and almost kill'd the third. Fie was at work in the Field with' Jebn and Benjamin Hatberly, his Master's Sons, one of them twelve, the other about ten Years of Age, when one of them ask'd him if he thought he could make a Thousand Hills bifure Night; for they were making Hills for Tobacco; he told the Boy he would let him know before Night, and immediately, without the heast Provocation, struck John on the Head with his Line. Hoe, and knock'd him down, and then repeated his Blows in he kill'd him on the Spot: Little Benjamin feeing his poor Brother thus butcher'd, and expeding the fame Fate, run from him to the Distance of about 60 or 80 Yards where he was stopped by a Fence, and there the Villain overtook him, and with the same Hoe, knock'd him down, so that he could remenber no more, for he was left for dead; but after some Time recover'd, and is now to well as to appear in Court as an Eridence; but his Skull on the back of the Head is dented in al. most as deep, and full as large, as a Sancer, and he lost a val deal of Blood. From the Field the Villain went to the House, and there with a Knife stabb'd Elizabeth Hatherly, a Gol of about 14 Years of Age, in feveral Places, and then with in Axe gave her fevera! Blows on the Head, which kill'd ber, but the did not die immediately, for there were some Signs of Life in her when her Father and Mother came home at Night; for they had that Day been to a Funeral at some Diffance. Their Trouble and Diffres on this melancholy and shocking fight, is easier to be conceived than expressed. Beneal Lin-nard Hatheriy, another Child, about 9 Years of Age, who appeared in Court to witness against the Morderer, being in the House, endeavoured to help his Sister, and took hold of the Knife, telling him not to kill Bet; but he plucked the Knife (which happened to be dull) throe the Child's Hand, which cat him in several Places. After he had perpetrated these atrocious Murders, he made off, and got a few Miles from the House, but Vengeance pursued him, and he was soon taken up, and secured in Goal. He was arraign'd upon one Indiament only, which was for the Murder of Blizabeth, to which, on Trill he pleaded Not Guilty; but the Evidence against him was so full and explicit, that the Jury did not early two Minutes be-fore they brought him in Guilty.

By Letters from London, which came by the way of Puglinia, we hear, That the Quair's Supply, Capt. Hope, was got fafe Home.—That the Experiment, Capt. Camain was lafe arriv'd in St. George's Channel,--That Cape. Sedgenick, in the Friendship, and three of his Men, were wash'd overboard; the three Men drowned, but he was fared-Gentleman writes in a Letter of December 21.
