CONSTANTINOPLE, July 23. Year, the Plague has so confiderably augmented. as to oblige the Inhabitants to be almost continual ly removing from one Village to another, or rather from one Seat of Infection to the other; for even the remotest Paris, which were always thought to be the most secure, have not been exempt. In the midst of this Calamity, we have had four successive Fires; the first on the pinth Inflant, near the Mosque of Sultan Mehomet, which burnt for 21 Hours, with a violent North-East Wind, by which nine Districts of the Town have been consumed, each District containing about 700 Houses, among which were the Quarters of the Janizaries, confilling of 98 Ranges of Chambers, each usually containing from 350 to 400 Men. The Janizaries then present, to the Number of about 20,000, were, in this Extremity, obliged to encamp on the great Place called the Eithmeidan; 200 of them have been fince missing, and it is concluded were destroyed in attempting to extinguish the The other three Fires were less considerable, burning only four or five Hours each; by which, however, many Seraglio's of the great Men of this Government, have been re-

duced to Ashes. Hamburg, August 27. Letters from Constantinople say, that the Plague rages so violently, as to carry off daily upwards

of 1000 Persons in that Capital.

Aleppo, June 22. By Letters from Baffors, of the 15th of May, we are informed, that the Dutch Affairs are much perplexed both on that, and the Mallabar Coast, and even on Java, through the Wars they are engaged in with the Country People; and the Death of their General, Baron Imhoff, fliil adds to the Confusion of their Affairs.

Genoa, August 14. Two of our Galleys, which lately went in Quest of the Corsairs of Barbary, brought Yesterday into this Port two Merchant Ships bearing the Turkish Flag, bound to the Levant, and laden with divers Kinds of Merchandize.

Schaffbaufen, August 24. We are affured that the Pope, the Courts of Turin and Naples, the Duke of Modena, the Republics of Venice, Genoa, and Lucca, have unanimously resolved again to make strong Representations to the Emperor, as Grand Duke of Tukeny, to engage his Imperial Majesty not to grant the Barbary Corlairs in future any Rerread in his Ports, because of the inexpressible Damage that has resulted therefrom to the Commerce of the Christian Powers in the Mediterranean.

Amsterdam, Sept. 3. We have Advice that the King of Denmark has bought of the Emperor of Morocco, for the Sum of 70,000 Ducais, the Ports of Saffia and St. Croix, on the

The old Lady, a Women of 70, who fometimes had a Maid to lie with her. cried out, upon hearing of it, What a Miracle have I escaped ! It might as well have happened to me!

From the Utrecht Gazette we learn, that the English Eaft-India Company have resolved to contract for four Companies of Switzers, of 150 Men each; they are to rendezvous at a Town upon the Rhine, in order to embark for England, where they are immediately to receive f 7 each Man, and from thence to serve in the Settlement of that Company.
