History of "Soldiers" Dolight How it Received its Name.—In answer to the Journal's ame quantity of heat is always annually distributed over the earth's surface, although unequally —that is to say, the average annual temperature of the following account of this portion of Baltimore each place upon the earth's surface is very nearly coived its name, and how, and where, we may give the following account of this portion of Baltimore county:

This exceptional year makes things look conversely. We had a very cool summer, late spring, and an early autumn. Snow fell in the suburbs of London in July. York Road at Towson, is one of the oldest roads in the State, if not in the country. This Old Hundred, now comprising an area of only about four miles square, then (about the year 1070) included what is now Lisbon. District, in Howard county, with parts of what is still called 'Carroll's big woods;" the 2d and part of the 4th Districts of Baltimore county; the Freedom, Frank-lin, Woolery and New Windsor, Districts of Carroll county; and the Liberty and other Districts of what is now Frederick county west to the Blue Ridge, comprising an area of land twenty miles wide by about forty in length, and including the plateau of Westminster, the Pipe Creek and Middletown Valley, the rich bottom lands of North Branch. * What is now called "Soldiers' Delight" is a tract of land lying within the confines of the 2d and 4th Districts of Baltimore county, six miles north by northwest of Pikesville, and comprising at the present time, as we have said before, an area of about four to five miles square.

The bed of this tract of country is composed of great masses of serpentine rock, traversed by square and diagonal fractures at frequent intervals, and which gives to its hilly and weatherbeaten surface the appearance of gaping wounds in a parched skin or integument. Here and there the monotony of the scene is relieved by a patch of the glistening ivy bush, or a group of stunted oaks, or "black jacks." Concerning the origin of the name of this tract and the time it was applied calls for several different versions, and, as the writer cannot positively say which is correct, the reader is left to In the year 1666, or seven years after the forma-tion of Baltimore county, the Susquehanna Indians, a flerce and warlike tribe, then inhabiting that part of Baltimore county which bordered on Pennsylvania, broke in upon the settlers round the head-waters of the Gunpowder and Patapsco with the firebrand and the tomahawk and carried death and destruction far and near. For fourteen years this warfare raged, necessitating the employment of a warfare raged, necessitating the employment of a body of troops to constantly patrol the then frontier of Baltimore county, extending from the Patapsco through Soldiers' Delight, crossing below Owings' Mills and extending down into the Green Spring Valley, and from there on through to the site of what was afterwads the town of Joppa. The soldiers in patroling this beat frequently lost their way in that part of the country pow called the way in that part of the country now called the "Delight," and named the section in irony, saying that it was a "delightful" country to get lost in, be-Chestnut Grove Presbytcrian Church, Sweet Air.—Services every Sabbath at 11 A. "Delight," and named the section in irony, saying that it was a "delightful" country to get lost in, being full of pitfalls and treacherous ravines, and pastor, Rev. W. W. Reese. would take several days sometimes before the troops were able to find their way out. Again the tradition is that early in the days of the county a party of soldiers and settlers, who had penetrated into the then wilderness of what is now Carroll and Frederick counties, were so harrassed by the lurking and savage foe that on reaching this tract of the county, far from the lurking places of the savages, that they here halted and reorganized their demoralized forces before they proceeded back to the settlements. and, before leaving, being so well pleased with the situation and aspect of this portion of the county they named it "Soldiers' Delight," a name that it has ever since held. Delight" is a range of very high hills lying about one hundred yards west of the Old Deer Park Road, which traverses this section, and from the highest one of these, known as "Berry's Hill," was hanged and gibbeted John D. Berry, a young man of about 20 years of age, for the murder of Mrs. Clark, his step-mother, in the hope of obtaining possession of her property. Berry had for his accomplices two indentured English servant girls—Mary Powell and Martha Bassett. Through the efforms of Mordecal Gosnell. Constable of the county, (great-great-uncle

to the writer, this crime, which was one of the greatest ever committed in the colonies, was unearthed, and Berry and his girl-accomplices mot their doom. The murder was committed in the month of November, 1751, and the murderers were executed in January, 1752, (swift justice as compared with the law's delay at the present time,) the two girls at Joppa on the 10th, and Berry on the 15th, on the hill which has since retained his name, and the stories and traditions of his crime are still told throughout the neighborhood. From this point one of the grandest views in the State can be had.
