The General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church at its recent session established a new Order in the Church, to be known as "Deaconesses," whose duty will be similar to that of the Sisters of Charity of the Catholic Church. The movement is no doubt a most excellent oue. If the new Order of Deaconesses are so organized that they shall be entirely released from worldly cares and they themselves take those vows of self-denial which so distinguishes the noble Sisters of Charity, then will the Order have a chance for success. But, if there should be any salary business attached to it the end may be seen from the beginning. There is he reason why there should not be more of such noble Orders as Sisters of Charity, or Deaconesses, or by whatever appropriate

name they may be called. The Sisters of Charity of the Catholic Church have shed the most brilliant lustre upon the name of woman. Wherever disease, suffering, want and distress in all its myriad forms are known, there may these noble women be found. No fear of disease, no matter how contagious, deters them when duty points the way. They literally carry their lives in their hands.-There is no instance on record where any person, no matter how deprayed, has rudely treated these ministering angels. There is a sanctity about these women which inspires sublime awe. Their quiet, unobtrusive manner; their complete knowledge of the management of the sick in all character of diseases; their firmness and devotion to duty, no matter how irksome, and their utter self-abnegation, challenges the highest homage of mankind.

The Order of "Deaconesses" will no doubt be hailed with pleasure, and the hone is that it may become an eminent success. The Baltimore Methodist Episcopal Ministers, at their regular weekly meeting on Monday, gave their approbation to the new Order by the adoption of the following resolutions:

WHEREAS, The General Conference at its last session defined the duties of Deaconesses and made provision for their appointment and employment; solved. That we heartily concur in this action of the General Conference and approve of the employment of women who, relinquishing all other pursuits, shall under the supervision of the church ote themselves wholly to the labors of love defined in the Discipline.

Resolved. That we deem it desirable to have a home for Deaconesses in Baltimore City, and hereby commend this subject to the thought and prayer and liberality of our people.

Resolved, That the Annual Conference at its coming session be requested to appoint the Conference Board of Deaconesses, provided for in the Disci-pline, so that the work of Deaconesses, if initi-ated anywhere within the bounds of our Conference during the coming year, may have the proper

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
