The provisions are as follows:

First: By virtue of the power given to me under the will of John S. The disturbance from all accounts given, was noticed about 20 minutes to 7 o'clock and was only of a few seconds duration.

Mr. George L. Stockstale's family, of Towson, reported the fact and were sure that it was something of an earth shock. Mr. Milton Dance, of "Valley View" lulany's Valley, felt the schook very distinctly and was satisfied that it was something similar to the shock hat caused such dire results in Charleston, S. C.
Col. John N. Carroll, of "Caves," felt the shock,
out at the time attributed it to some other cause. lis boys, however, at the time were convinced that it was an earthquake and his coachman was considerably alarmed by the rocking of his house. or of Darley Park, said her husband was sick in

bed, and about twenty minutes to seven o'clock she was rubbing Mr. Shriner with liniment, when the windows rattled violently, and the house trembled so she quit rubbing her husband. He asked his wife why she stopped rubbing him. She told him that she felt the whole house shaking. She hought it was caused by some unusually big wagon passing the door.

John P. Dignan, reading the paper, and felt the shock. The whole house shook.

Mrs. Annie Harpel, on the Harford road, felt the shock, and said it was like the rumbling of thunder. Her house shivered, and she thought it would ertainly fall down. Mrs. Caroline Lockman and Miss Annie Kelly of Homestead, were greatly alarmed by the shock and fied to the yard.

Miss Mamie Sly, of Homestead, was visiting Miss Brooks, a neighbor, when the house and windows shook, the stove-door flew open, and the stove dropped one of its legs. Miss 8ly ran ont and went to her home, and there found her mother frantic from

the shock.

Mr. M. R. Hussey, next door to No. 5 Chemical Engine, Homestead, thought the doors were being pulled off the hinges, so great was the shock.

Mr. R. Anderson, of Homestead Heights, Jefferson street, was at supper with his family, when the big house began to shake. He felt two distinct shocks, and each made a rumbling noise similar to thunder.

Mrs. H. E. Smith, of Harrison street, Homestead,
was badly frightened by the quake, which shook
her house and made the dishes rattle in the cupoard. It had a roaring sound like a lion Mack Brook's dwelling also took the chills and fevers, and for a few seconds did some shaking.

Conrad Hess, florist, felt the shock and heard the roaring sound. He thought some animal had got-

ten into his greenhouse. He went in, but could find nothing wrong.

Meine old hen vas setting two veeks on eggs to make young chickens. Dot old chicken never come off de eggs to cat somedings, but de noise from de Erdbeben had scared de old chicken off dem eggs, and she vas looking at dem eggs in de box, crying."
