Catomaville Itoms.—The annual meeting of the tockholders of the Catonsville Short Line Railroad was held on Tuesday evening, 18th inst. Mr. Talbot J. Albert was called to the chair and Mr. John Wilson acted as Secretary. The report of the President gives a very favorable showing for the year ending December 31st, 1889. The gross earn ngs were \$11,911, expenses \$9,941, net earnings \$1, 170. Messrs. James A. Gary, Henry James, John Gill, Dr. C. G. W. Macgill, Eugene Carrington, Gustav Gleske and James W. Harvey, Jr., were re-elected Directors. The Board subsequently organized by electing James A. Gary, President; Eugene Carrington, Secretary, and John Gill, Treasurer. The business of the road is steadily increasing, the earnings for May of this year alone showing an increase of nearly \$500 over the same month of last year. A number of new buildings have been erected at Catonsville the present year, some of them being very beautiful in design and convenient in appointments. Worthy of special mention are the fourteen erected by Mr. W. L. Stork, at Paradise Park, which are supplied with gas and water throughout; in fact, combining all the conveniences of the city with the advantages of the country. Catonsville seems to be very fortunate in having such men as W. L. Stork, Joseph M. Cone, John Hubner, and others, whose enterprise is fast making our town one of the most beautiful suburban points around Baltimore. Among other improve-ments talked of is that of laying a curb and asphalt pavement on the south side of Frederick Avenue from Bloomsburg Lane to Newburg Avenue. The accused, a dirty-looking, crossed-eyed negro denied everything alleged against her, and went on to accuse Rev. Mr. Puffenberger of taking liberties with her and attempting an assault on her. Kate Johnson, a yellow-looking negro woman from Baltimore, said to be the keeper of a brothel was brought to testify against the Rev. Mr. Pufferberger to attempting an assault on her, and to offer-ing her \$5. She said he had done this while his wife was out on a visit, and it was afterwards proven that during the time she was in their employ as a servant Mrs. Puffenberger was sick and had not gone out of the house.
