Highway Robery.-On Sunday morning last, 23d inst., John Ruhland, a garden trucker living on the Mount Carmel road, near O Donnell street Can-ton, was walking home from the Broadway Market with two friends, John and Steve Benton. Dr. Stevens Convicted .- The case of Dr. Francis Stephens, sometimes known as Dr. Sydney D. Grant, charged with causing the death of Pauline Bouchat by malpractice on the 27th of December, 1887, came up for trial before Chief Judge Yellott and Associate Judges Watters and Fowler in the Circuit Court for Baltimore County on the 21st inst., Mr. N. Chas. Burke, the States Attorney, assisted by Mr. John Grason, prosecuting. Messrs. Edgar H. Gans. Edward I. Clark and R. R. Boarman appeared for the defense. After the examination of a number of witnesses and an able and exhaustive argumen by the learned counsel engaged on both sides the Associate Judges rendered a verdict of guilty of murder in the second degree. The counsel filed a motion in arrest of judgment for the accused and grye notice of an appeal on the ground that a verdict in a criminal case, when rendered by the judges, should be unanimous, the same as required of a jury.
