The Maryland Central Railroad Bridge at Towson.—The long pending question of the removal of the trestles of the Maryland Central Railroad in the bed of the York Turnpike at Towson has at last been solved by their entire removal on Wednesday night, 28th inst., and now the Turnpike presents a decidedly better appearance and is en- | son for \$1,000 irely safe for driving. During the past two weeks the Maryland Central have been erecting a heavy wooden bridge to span the 66 feet of the Turnpike. As it stands on Thursday morning it does not make as unsightly appearance as at first supposed, but if boarded upon either side, 8 feet high for a distance of 166 feet on each side, it will be decidedly insightly. This portion of the bridge (the boarding up part) is being done, it is stated, in accordance with the demands of Mr. S. H. Tagart, Presi dent of the Turnpike Company, agreeably to the agreement entered into between the Railroad and the Turnpike authorities April 17th 1879, when the crossing of the furnpike was first made. The Railroad authorities having decided not to erect an iron bridge, the present wooden structure is the best that could be put up, and there is no doubt that it is perfectly safe. It is wide sufficient to admit of a standard guage track, which, it is stated, will ultimately be laid over the entire line of the will ultimately be laid over the entire line of the road. Eggs in Case of Trouble.-The white of an egg is said to be a specific remedy for fish bones sticking in the throat. When, as sometimes by accident, corrosive sublimate is swallowed, the white of one or two eggs taken will neutralize the poison and change the effect to that of a dose of calomel.
