Rev. Andrew B. Cress.

On Friday 6th inst. Rev. Andrew B. Cross, aged 78 years, a Presbyterian minister, died at his residence in Baltimore. The deceased was well knewn in Baltimore county. He was educated at Dr. Magraw's Academy, in Cecil county, Dickinson College and at Princeton, where he graduated. He en-John I. Vellett, Stato's Attorney, ad interim. John W. Shanklin, Olork. Joshus Tracey, Sheriff lege and at Princeton, where he graduated. He entered the theological seminary, but owing to a hemorrhage, in 1833, he was advised to go to Florida, but refused. He recruited at the home of his grandnother, Mrs. Jane Boyd, in Lancaster county, Pa. and in 1884 delivered sermons, addresses on temperance, lectures, etc., in Pennsylvania and elsewhere. In 1885, 1886 and 1887 he managed a prosperous Sunday School in Moncur Institute, Fell's Point, and worked through East Baltimore generally. In 1887 he was called to Bethel Church, with a wide circuit, where he continued to work until 1845. When disabled by rheumatism he came to Baltimore. From 1845 to 1849 he edited the Maryland Temperance Herald. From 1848 to 1861 he officiated in a number of churches from Texas, along the Northern Central road to Hanover. He preached to soldiers till the battle of Gettysburg, in 1863, when he went into the hospital there. From December 1863 to 1865 he was connected with the Christian Commission at

Point Lookout, Fort Delaware and other prisons.— After the war he preached in Baltimore and elsewhere, sometimes in the open air, in halls, etc., and Offutt, and others. delivering lectures on temperance and other subects. He took a deep interest in the sessions of the resbytery, and never failed to take an active part n the discussion. He was fond of preaching to the young. His first wife was Miss Margaret Irvine lickey, who died May 2, 1882. In 1885 he married Miss Marian Livingstone Ramsey, who survives him. By his first marriage he had two sons, Mr. W. Ir-vine Cross, a member of the Bar of Baltimore city, and Rev. Craig Cross, a minister in an adjoining county. Mr. E. J. D. Cross, the lawyer, is his ephew. Funeral services were held at Faith Presoyterian Chapel. The funeral was very large, and the church was filled to repletion with the relatives and friends of the deceased. Rev. 
