In a Railroad Wreck.-Mr. G. P. Sheppard, of Govanstown, accompanied by his wife, was in the passanger train that was wrecked on the Philadel phia, Wilmington and Baltimore Railroad, on aturday last, 12th inst. Mr. Shepard gives a graphic lescription of the accident, and says he does not want to repeat the experiment. Mr. and Mrs. Shepard were among the luckey ones, escaping vithout even a scratch. The train was known as Washington express, bound for Philadelphia. It lef Baltimore a few minutes behind time, carrying about one hundred passengers. Many of them were Knights Templar and their wives returning rom Washington, where they had been attending the annual conclave. The train consisted of engine No. 322, the Pullman car "Somerset," a baggage car and three coaches. The train, when she left Perryvide, was making from fifty to fifty-five miles an

hour. Ahead of the express went a freight train. When about half a mile south of North East, an iron-barred gate fell from one of the freight cars directly upon the track. The express came along ind swept around the curve at fifty miles an hour. In an in tant there was a horrible sound. The ocomotive had struck the gate. The locomotive jumped the track, ran up a sixfoot embankment, and plowed through it till it had embedded itself three teet in the bank. The tender was wrenched from the engine, kept on a few yards and was turned over on its side upon the bank. The Pullman, which was next to the tender, turned over on the west track, and plowed it up fo the distance of about a dozen yards. The coaches behind let the rails and kept ou, passing the engine

lender and Pullman, which were on each side. The trucks and cars seemed to act as a huge plow, which had been placed just below the ties and, moved by an irresistible force, had made a huge, deep furrow. Rails, ties stones and dirt were swept to each side, and, where the track had been, there was nothing but a huge deep furrow. As soon as the train left the track the confusion was terrific. The whole place was hidden by dust. which covered everything. The huge engine lay on her side, and from her steam was pouring, mak ing a most distracting noise, and above all could be heard the cries of the women. Fortunately, there were but three or four people in the Pullman, which was the only car which had turned over Among them were the Misses Tingler, of Unadilla, N. Y., the colored porter and the Pullman conductor. After the terrible bumping had ceased, the persons in the other cars managed to get out and they went to the assistance of those in the Pullman. I wo ladies were caught by their arms and dragged brough the window. The conductor, Lawton, was dragged out, and when he reached the bank he became unconscious. He had been thrown against the side of the car, striking on his head

and shoulders. Lying near the engine, on the ground, was the engineer, Beckley. He had sustained a compound fracture of his left leg, and was bruised about the head. The accident happened so nickly that he didn't know how he had been hurt. His injuries were very painful, and he was not fortunate enough to forget his pains in unconscious These were the only two seriously hurt. Notice to Hotel Keepers and all Others who Deal in Liquors. For the information of all persons concerned, the following Act of the Legislature, passed March 24th, 1865, is published CHAPTER 191.

AN ACT prohibiting the sale of spirituous or fermented liquors in the several Counties of the State on the day SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That it shall not be lawful for the keeper of any hotel, tavern, store, drinking establishment or any other place where liquors are sold, or for any person or persons, directly or indirectly, to sell, barter, give, or dispose of any spirituous or fer-mented liquors, ale, beer, or intoxicating drinks of any kind, on the days of election hereafter to be held in the several counties of the State.

SEC. 2. And be it enacted. That any person violating the provisions of this Act shall be liable to indictment by the Grand Jury of the county where the offence is committed, and shall, upon conviction before any Judge of any of the Circuit Courts of this State, be fined a sum not less than fifty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each and every offence—one half the fine shall be paid to the informer, the other half to the County Commission-

ers, for the use of public roads.
