Epiphany College Dedicated .- The Epiphany Apostolic College, formerly known as the Highland Park Hotel, which is under the charge of the Josephite Fathers for the purpose of educating colored men for the Catholic priesthood was dedicated with appropriate religious services on Tuesday, 19th inst., Cardinal Gibbons officiating. Samuel Parker Bosley. Samuel Parker Bosley, a prominent member o the Bar of Baltimore county and a highly respected citizen of Towson, died at his residence on Tuesday evening, 19th inst., in the 50th year of his age.
For more than a year he had been in ill health, suffering from that terrible malady consumption, but through all his long illness he bore his sufferings with the specient patients and production. but through all his long lilness he bore his sufferings with the greatest patience and resignation. A year since Mr. Bosley, in hopes of getting relief and staying the progress of the disease, went to Denver, Colorado, where he spent the winter; but he failed to receive permanent relief. Whilst at Denver he was visited by the Odd Fellows of that city, who had him in charge upon the sick list by request of Towson Lodge, 79, of which body he was a Past Grand of many years standing. He remained at March. The ushers were—Herbert Lee, brother of the bride; Leon Bosley, brother of the groom, and Joseph B. Murray'and Harry Hook, cousins of the bride. The happy couple left for their home on "The Manor," where Mr. Bosley is engaged in busi-Grand of many years standing. He remained at Denver about 6 months, when he returned home and continued to decline until death relieved him of his sufferings. Mr. Bosley was a native of Baltimore county. having been born on "My Lady's Manor," 10th District. He was educated in the Public Schools of Baltimore county. In 1865 he taught the public school in Towson, and whilst doing so prepared

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himself for the Bar, to which he was admitted. He was a patient student and had achieved quite an extensive practice, was a safe counsellor in the investment of money and enjoyed a liberal business in that respect. In politics Mr. Bosley was a Republican. During the second administration of President Grant he was Chief Weigher in the Baltimore Custom House. In 1882 Mr. Bosley was the Republican candidate for Associate Judge, the present Chief Judge Fow-Dorsey, Miss Alberta Hooper, Miss Mary Hooper and Miss Stella Benninghaus. Mr. Bosley was a Past Grand of Towson Lodge, 79, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, and was also a member of the Knights of Pythias and the Ancient Order of United Workmen.
